Netherlands-India.	Hongkong declared an infected port. Importation of the following articles from Hongkong or transhipped at this port is temporarily prohibited:—Animal refuse, claws and hoofs; human hair, animal hair and bristles; hides untanned, salted or cured with arsenic; raw wool and rags; used bags or sacks; as also tapestry and used embroideries, unless they form part of personal luggage or household effects being removed.	12th May, 1911.
