NOTICES TO MARINERS.

SOUTH AUSTRALIA.

SPENCER GULF.

Wallaroo Boat Harbor.

MASTERS of Vessels, Pilots, and others are hereby informed that on and after the night of the 12th December, 1913, an unwatched Fixed White Light will be exhibited from the northern end of the Breakwater forming the Wallaroo Boat Harbor.

The Light is carried on a wooden post, and is 15 feet above high water. It shows all round the horizon, and in clear weather should be visible for a distance of 3 miles.

Approximate position—Latitude, $33^{\circ} 55\frac{1}{2}'$ S.; Longitude, $136^{\circ} 37\frac{1}{2}'$ E.

WEST COAST.

MASTERS of Vessels and others are hereby informed that 6th Order Port Lights have been established at the following places instead of the low-power lights previously exhibited:—

Denial Bay.

A Fixed Light at sea end of jetty, from a cast-iron pillar painted red, at a height of 22ft. above H.W., showing white between the bearing of 283° (N. 80° W. mag.) and 326° (N. 37° W. mag.) and red between 326° (N. 37° W. mag.) and 350° (N. 13° W. mag.). In clear weather the white light should be visible at a distance of eight miles, and the red five miles.

Approximate position—Lat. $32^{\circ} 6\frac{1}{2}'$ S., long. $133^{\circ} 35\frac{1}{2}'$ E.

Murat Bay.

A Fixed Light at sea end of jetty from a cast-iron pillar, painted red, at a height of 28ft. above H.W.; showing white between the bearing of 66° (N. 63° E. mag.) and 119° (S. 64° E. mag.) and red between 50° (N. 47° E. mag.) and 66° (N. 63° E. mag.), over the dangers of Cape Thevenard. In clear weather the white light should be visible at a distance of nine miles, and the red five miles.

Approximate position—Lat. $32^{\circ} 7\frac{3}{4}'$ S., long. $133^{\circ} 40\frac{1}{4}'$ E.

ENCOUNTER BAY.

River Murray.

On Mundoo Island, inside the Mouth of the River Murray, a light has been established, showing a white flash 30 times per minute at a height of 25ft. above H.W., on an iron post painted red and surrounded by a galvanized-iron fence, painted white. In clear weather the light should be visible at a distance of about eight miles.

Approximate position—Lat. $35^{\circ} 34'$ S., long. $135^{\circ} 54\frac{1}{4}'$ E.

KANGAROO ISLAND.

Hog Bay.

The light is of the 6th Order, and is placed on an iron pillar on the sea end of the Hog Bay Jetty, its focal plane being about 20ft. above H.W., and it is visible for a distance of about eight miles. Further details as to characteristics of the light will be published at an early date.

CANTON RIVER—WHAMPOA CHANNEL.

Sulphur Point Lighted Beacon Established.

NOTICE is hereby given that a Beacon, painted *red* and exhibiting a *red* unclassified light, has been established to mark the end of the spit that extends to the south-eastward from Pedder Island and the northern side of the channel at the eastern entrance to the Whampoa Channel, Canton River.

The Beacon is in 7 feet of water at low water of spring tides, and from it the eastern side of the Whampoa Dock gate bears S. 38° E., magnetic, distant 2·17 cables.

Upon the petition of the Honourable Mr. John Alexander Strachey Bucknill His Majesty's Attorney General for the Colony of Hongkong on the Twenty-third day of March, 1914, preferred unto this Court praying for an order that the Committee of the City Hall be at liberty to hand over to the University of Hongkong and that the said University may be at liberty to receive a collection of books at present housed in the City Hall Public Library and designated the "Morrison Library" upon the following terms and conditions, that is to say:—

- (a) The said collection to be maintained by and at the cost of the said University in the buildings of the said University and to be retained by the said University until such time if any as the Committee of the City Hall may desire its return to them when it shall be unconditionally handed back to them on demand.
