## ALTERATIONS IN BUOYAGE.

Reference to Special Notice to Mariners No. 529, notice is hereby given that the following alterations have been made in the buoyage of the Tsungming Crossing, North Channel Entrance to the Yangtze River:—

The Middle Island Buoy has been discontinued.

The East Entrance Buoy has been moved and its navigating colour changed from red to black. From the new position of the Buoy, Liuchiao Beacon bears N. 80<sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub>° E., distant 1.56 miles. This Buoy is now moored in 42 feet of water and marks the southern side of the channel in the eastern approach to the Tsungming Crossing.

The Crossing Buoy has been moved and its navigating colour changed from red to black. From the new position of the Buoy, Middle Island Beacon bears S. 24\frac{3}{4}\circ E., distant 3.38 miles. This Buoy is now moored in 23 feet of water on the southern side of the Tsungming Crossing.

The West Spit Buoy has been moved and is now moored in 40 feet of water. From the new position of the Buoy, Middle Island Beacon bears S. 72½° E., distant 5.78 miles. The characteristics of this Buoy remain unchanged.

All bearings given are magnetic, and depths are those of low water of extraordinary spring tides.

### A BILL

#### INTITULED

An Ordinance to provide for the Incorporation of the Missions to Seamen in Hongkong.

BE it enacted by the Governor of Hongkong, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows :-

- 1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Missions to Short title. Seamen in Hongkong Incorporation Ordinance, 1919.
- 2. In this Ordinance unless the context otherwise Interpretarequires :-
  - "The Bishop" means the Bishop of the Church of England known as the Bishop of Victoria for the time being officiating in this Colony.
  - "The Chaplain" means the senior Chaplain of the Missions to Seamen in Hongkong for the time being officiating in this Colony.
- 3. The Bishop, the Chaplain, and such other persons Incorporates shall from time to time be certified by the Bishop tion.

The Corporation by the name aforesaid shall have Succession perpetual succession and shall and may sue and be sued and seal. in all Courts of Justice and before all Magistrates in this Colony, and shall and may have and use a common seal, and may from time to time break, change, alter and make anew the said seal as to the Corporation may seem fit.
