COLONIAL SECRETARY'S DEPARTMENT.

No. S. 287.—It is hereby notified, with reference to Notification No. S. 1 published in the *Gazette* of the 3rd January, 1919, that information has been received from the Consul-General for the Netherlands-India to the effect that the declaration of Hongkong as an infected port on account of plague has been rescinded by his Government.

No. S. 288.—It is hereby notified, with reference to Notification No. S. 88 of the 19th April, 1918, that information has been received from H. B. M. Consul at Ningpo to the effect that the sanitary measures imposed against arrivals from Hongkong have been withdrawn.
