No. S. 104.—A Government garage of nine compartments near Magazine Gap in the Peak District will be available shortly for the use of residents in the district. Applications for renting a compartment should be made in writing to the Colonial Treasurer.

The following rules will be enforced for the occupation of Government garages on the Peak:—

- (i.) The rent for each compartment of a garage is \$25 a month, payable at the Colonial Treasury in advance on the first business day of each month. This rent includes heating, lighting and water.
- (ii.) All tenancies will be reckoned from the first day of the month and no tenancy of less than one month will be recognised.
- (iii.) One month's notice from either side to discontinue the tenancy must be given.
- (iv.) The tenant is responsible for all damage to the compartment occupied by him, or for any damage caused by him or his servants to any part of the garage.
- (v.) The tenant is responsible for keeping the compartment occupied by him in a clean condition, and on vacating the premises will be charged the cost of cleaning and all damage other than fair wear and tear.
- (vi.) No persons other than the Government caretaker will be allowed to reside in a garage.
