A BILL

INTITULED

An Ordinance to amend the Fraudulent Transfers of Businesses Ordinance, 1923.

BE it enacted by the Governor of Hongkong, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:—

Short title: 1. This Ordinance may be cited as the Fraudulent Transfers of Businesses Amendment Ordinance, 1924.

Amendment of Ordinance No. 25 of 1923, s. 3 (3). 2. Section 3 (3) of the Fraudulent Transfers of Businesses Ordinance, 1923, is amended by the insertion of the following at the end of the list of particulars specified therein:—

(e.) a statement as to the nature of the business transferred or to be transferred.

Objects and Reasons.

This bill is introduced on the suggestion of the Board of Trade. It proposes to add to the list of particulars which must be given in the notice referred to in the principal Ordinance a statement as to the nature of the business transferred or to be transferred.
