Koseki-sho Buoy Withdrawn—Koseki-sho Beacon Established.

The Japanese Harbour Authorities at Dairen, in a Notice to Mariners dated 12th November, 1926, have issued the following information:—

Notice is hereby given that the Koseki-sho Buoy (black conical), marking Koseki-sho, close south-eastward of the rock awash about ½ mile eastward of Segment

Rock, off the southern point of Da-chan-shan-tao, Elliot Group, was withdrawn on the 8th instant and the Koseki-sho Beacon has been established there as follows:—

The beacon is 20 feet high above sea-level and painted black, surmounted by a black spherical daymark.

Furthermore, another black wooden beacon has been established on the branch shoal, N. 12° W. from Koseki-sho Beacon, distance 4 cables, 16 feet high above sea-level.
