thority, for general information It has been lately Notified by Procla-mation of the Chief Magistrate, to the Chinese Inhabitants of Hongkong, that between the hours of eight and ten P. M., they are prohibited from being out of their houses without lanthorns, and that after ten o'clock P. M., and until daylight on the following morning, no Chinese will, in future be permitted to go out, under any consideration, unless he can produce a pass in English, specifying his object in being out at so late an hour.

A Proclamation has also been issued, prohibiting, under penalty of severe punishment, all Chinese Boats or Vessels, from moving about the harbour after Gun-fire at nine o'clock P. M., and until Gun-fire at daylight on the following morning.

The upshot of the whole affair will be nearly as follows. The merchants will, nominally, receive scarcely on-shift of what they originally paid directly to the Past India Company, or indirectly in the realisation of its revenue, and this will amount to a loss to them of, at least, one million sterling. By the prescribed form of payment, they will lose a full one fifth part eyen of the profined sum, and this will amount to some 240,000th more. Then they will lose four years interest on their whole capital, which, not at Indian interest, which it bors, but morely at European, will amount to—at-least 300,000li-! In the megnwhile the loss of the merchants is the gain of other parties. They, the merchants, are made to pay for the life and liberty of her Mujesty's Pleniponteniary, as the Treaty expressly tells us. The East India revenue has gained, at least a million sterling within the last furityears the destruction of the merchants property; and Sir Robert transfers a million sterling, from their pockets to the public treasury.

We take the appointment of M. Lagrence to the post of French Minister in Ohina to be an additional proof that the policy of the French Government abroad is mainly regulated by the effect which it is calculated to produce at home; for. it is utterly impossible that this gentleman should convey to the incredulous advisers of his Celestial Majesty an accurate or adequate idea of the greatness of a nation like France, whose commerce is scarcely known in the ports of China, and whose political influence is less felt than that of Holland, or Portugal, in the seas of Asia. The immense extension of the commercial relations of China and Great Britain, is obviously due to the singular importance which all classes in this country altach to the use of the Asia. The immense extension of the commercial relations of China and domestic habits. In other countries tage is a luxury, in England it is a necessary. Other countries might rival us in the production of manufactures suited to the Chinese markets, but there is not the slightest-probability that any European people, or any people not of British, origin, will ever afford a better market than ourselves to this important article of Chinese frowth. We may safely disclaim on the part of this country any intention of asserting or exercising any exclusive commercial privileges, or of seeking to place British trade under what we hold to be the noxious influence of artificial protection. But-certain branches of trade with certain countries are powerfully affected by the habits and tastes of different communities. The indiagence of England must be felt in Portugal, in the long ruin because this is the only country in the world which offers a great and wealthy body of consumers for the red wines of Portugal, So also the influence of England is felt and will be felt in China, because the English are by far the most nameous and opilent customers of that country. ORIGINAL CORRESPONDENCE

(To the Editor of the Friend of China.) Chusan June 30th, 1843.

Shipments to this have in some instances resulted in disappointment on account of goods remaining long upon hand, reasonable expectation has not been realized, for since the termination of hostilities there has not been a commensurate increase of demand. It is difficult to conjecture the wherefore, but the trade from this, is conflued almost exclusively to Ningpo. No boats from Shi-poo or the south; and scarcely any from Hang-chow-foo or Chapoo to the North. We may yenture, a surmise, that it is either from restraint of the ruling powers, or the prevalence of Piratea, but we know no facts to establish the latter opinion.

Military examinations occur at periodical intervals, both at Chinhae and Ningpo. Went to parade ground of latter place, and witnessed the Military archery, examination - the archers were remarkably fine men—clad in silks—their accuracy of evolution and graceful, motion threw a particular interest into this exhibition. The Alum used in England is fabricated from Alum Stone, Shale or Schiet, and Clay principally at Whithy in Yorkshire and Campsie near (Glasgow It is, as our readers know, used by Dyers and Calico printers as a mordant, and by the leather dressers, indeed for many purposes of the arts and manufactures it is largely consumed. Although the lengish Alum is said to be very inferior sto the Roman and Eastern sorts, yet it must now suit well, or else the latter would have continued to be imported. We find by the Customs Returns, that no Foreign Alum, was cleared for home consumption, during the year 1940 and only duty to the amount of £ 5 19 10 was levied on Rook Alum from abroad. 
