It must be most painful to the feelings of every person who is aware of the fact, to know that the "many dead" of tig "Minden" are not granted the common interment given to the corpses of the felons that die in an English jail, but are taken out to sea, and thrown overboard by their relectant messmates who from their position in the service are unable to express their disapprobation, and whose footsteps on shore can never take them to the grave of a lost friend, they can erect no clombstone to mark his remains—and a father or a son though he may shed a tear for his loss, can never in privacy drop it on the earth that hides the dead. A dead body sewed up in a hammock and sunk with four shot, naturally rests on the bottem, is rapidly destroyed by the vermin that live in the deposit; the shot falls out of the sacking and the pody highly decomposed rises to the surface, perhaps in sight of the ship he belonged to. No less then four foolies in that state, partially exposed, have been in the harbor this week, a harrowing and disgusting spectacle to a class of men who may probably share their fate. It is not a feeling of mawkish sensibility that makes me write this, but a common respect for the dead bodies of my countrymen, Every one know that it is of little consequence where a body decompose, but I prefer the solitude and darkness of a sepurcher, to broad daylight and the gaze of men, for the remains of Englishmen, when it can be given them without encroaching on the rights of the living.

PETITION OF THE CHINESE LINGUISTS.

To the Foreign Merchants,
Readent at Canton.
We, the undersigned, Linguists, beg respectfully to call the attention of the Foreign Merchants residing at Canton, to the necessity of making some new arrangements for the remuneration of our services, suited to the altered state of the times.

Previously, we received an allowance called "thmtow" or "piculage", being a fee of so much per picul on all goods landed, [say one candarine, his cash per picul or shipped off, [say four cash, law cash per picul or shipped off, [say four cash, law, four cash, l'and the continue of the bound of the continue of the bound of the continue of the land of the continue of the con

Linguist must again go to the Hoppo's office to get the Hoppo's people to come out to examine the goods, and must send four assistants to help to weigh and measure the goods, arrange marks and numbers, open the Boxes and Bales, count the pieces, and arrange for sending every Merchants goods to the place where he wants there stored. When cargo is being shipped off, the Linguist goes to the different Merchants and gets their statement of what they are going to ship. After having written out a correct list, the Linguist requires to go to the Hoppo's to get his people to come out and examine the goods, and requires, as in the previous instances, to have some four people standing by, to open Boxes, arrange marks and numbers &c. &c., and afterwards, he has to go to the different Merchants to get their shipping notes. When the vessel is about to depart, the Linguist requires to go over the statement of dutties, and apportion to each man his share, and having completed all minor arrangements, he must go again to the Hoppo's to procure the Grand Chop.

Such are the principal services rendered by the Linguist to the Foreign Trade, besides many others, sufficiently annoying in themselves, but too minute to be detailed here. The new system too, gives us much more to do in the way of writing and running about, than the old system, besides, previously we always had some assistance from the Hong Merchants pursers, and psople, where as, now we are cast entirely on our own resources.

Of the various ways of charging remuneration for our

Of the various ways of charging remuneration for our services, many are objectionable. If we charge so much a ship a large ship may give us no trouble, and a small ship may be very troublesome. Charging permonth is objectionable, in as much as it would place the hard working man on the same footing as the man who does comparatively little. Charging 26 much per chop, is with all that may be argued against it, perhaps the least objectionable of all. But the old rule will require some modification. If we were to continue to charge \$15.22 upon all chops of import cargo, and nothing upon export cargo, on that case, when a ship arrived in ballast and went away full, we might have adeal of trouble, and no remuneration whatever.

After maturely considering the various points of the case, we have resolved to make the following charges for our services, which are respectfully submitted for your kind consideration, viz.

Howqua had attained his seventy fifth year when he died, and for a long time has been in a feeble state of health; with an extremely attenuated frame, but with nnimpaired intellectual vigour up to his last illness. Howqua was the guardian and comptroller of the Kong-soo fund, and the organ of communication between the Government and the Foreign Merchants. He possessed vast power and influence among his countrymen, was a large fanded proprietor, and had founded and endowed a temple to Buddha in the suburbs of Canton. It was supposed that the refusal of Howqua's prayer to retire into private life, was owing to the late war, and the claims which the Government might have on his services at such a crisis, we believe the truth was, that besides the undeniable influence Howqua possessed, yet his notorious wealth and success was the cause of his detention. The local Mandarins, and perhaps also some at Pekin, were well aware that Howqua was made of squeezable materials and as long as he occupied his onerous post, they could often test his qualities is that respect. It is alleged by his firends that Howqua would never consent to evade the duties, or smuggle any kind of goods, we doubt this, as he had branch houses at Soochow, Ningpo, Shanghai, and other opulent cities in China; it is hardly credible that he could successfully carry on his business there, with competitors who did smuggle whenever. They had the opportunity, and which the notorious venality of the Authorities rendered quite the rule, rather than the execution. rather than the exception.

In conclusion we are glad to record a gratifying fact which will embalm the memory of old Howqua. Since the difficulties about the Opiusa Trade, he has wholly abstained from touching the "unclean thing". Directly or indirectly, he has unformly refused again engaging in this traffic, although he might have added millions upon millions to his treasure. This is no mean testimony to his patriotism, and his respect for the laws and regulations of his Country. As a type of the old regime—as a Chinese conservative of the "purest ray serene" the death of Howqua will perhaps be deemed by his sovereign and country, as a positive national calamity.

The Canton Press says, by advice of the Consul this Petition has been granted, and an exaction of 200,000 dollars per annum sanctioned, by way of beginning the New System!

THE OFFICIAL RECEPTION OF THE FRENCH CONSTITUTE AT CANTON.

WE learn by letters from Canon, that the Charming Country House of Poon-Ping Quin, has served lately, for the scene of the presentation, by Monstein, the Count de Ratti Menton, the French Consul in China, of his credentials, to His Excellency the Viceroy

of Canton.

This ceremony, which was preceded by several visits, to the French Consul, and Captain Fornier Duplan; from the Kwang-Chow Foo, and a delegate from the Imperiol Commissioner, and to which the Chinese Authoperial Commissioner, and to which the Chinese Authorities seemed willing to give an celat, as marked as it was novel, may be considered another progressive step in the events which have help taken place. Towards 8 o'clock on the morning of the 6st inst., two boats from the French Corvette. Alcmene, with their crews in full dress, and having the national flag flying, left Canton, for the place of meeting. They contained the French Consul, Captain Fornier, Duplan, the Chancellor of the Consulate, eight Officers of the Corvette, an Interpreter chosen by Captain F. D. J. A. Durran, a French Merchant, and several desting distinguished persons who had expressed a desire

Corvette, an Interpreter chosen by Captain F. D. J. A. Durran, a French Merchant, and several other distinguished persons who had expressed a desire to be present at the ceremony.

After an hours pull, amidst numbers of boats, the inhabitants of which, saw for the first time with curricular and astonishment, so many French uniforms, they reached the House of Poon-Ting-Qua. The large halls, were at once placed at the disposal of the Captain and the Consul, where they received a visit from a delegate of the Imperial Commissioner, the Kwang-Chow-Poo and several other Mandarins. At near the hour fixed upon, a message came from the Commissioner, by an Officer, wearing a Chrystal button that he was prepared for the interview. Monsieur the Consul des Ratti Menton, and the Captain, accompanied by those persons already referred to, and preceded by a Mandarin, descended to the reception room, where they found the High Chinese Officers and a number of other functionaries wearing blue and white buttons. After a little complimentary conversation on polds sides, the French Consul, presented his credentials, from the French Minister for Foreign Affairs, to His Excellency the Vicercy, who handed them, to him, when this ceremony was concluded; many questions were put, concerning His Majesty, the King of the French, of Fraince generally, and is Ministers: M. Guizot particularly, became the subject of conversation. This continued for more than an hour, and did not interrupt a delicious collation, offered in the mean time, by the Chinese Authorities to their numerous Guests.

The many marks of attention of which Captain Fornier Duplan, the Consul, were the objects, in presence of nearly two hundred Chinese who composed the suites of the numerous Mandarins, would lead us to suppose that an important change, is beginning to operate, in their ideas with reference to Europeans. Such a disposition, managed with care, would appear to augur an approach to an entire friendly understanding between the Celestial Empire and the various European Governments. Communicated.
