

This and the further explanation of the Alphabet, when combined into words, illustrated by Mantchoo, besides Chinese examples, cannot but excite much attention particularly among the ruling order, or Tartar aristocracy.

The value of Mr. Thom's book to that portion of the Mercantile class, who are likely to come into contact with the British, is attested by the large sale which this work has met with, among the native community at Canton. And while it is intended to teach the Chinese, English, yet to those Chinese Students who have some acquaintance with the language and wish to obtain more; we know no work of equal utility, and of such whose objects are commercial, this work will be found of inappreciable value, particularly at Shanghai and Ningpo.

We understand this Volume is printed at the expense, and has been extensively but gratuitously distributed by the respected author, among the Foreign community in China. The New Consuls will be furnished with a supply of Copies, for the use of the native Merchants at the Northern Ports. We mention this, that our home readers may not suspect the Colburn and Bentley system of Book puffing has been introduced here. We have gone through Mr. Thom's work carefully and minutely, and the foregoing observations, are but a brief and poor expression of our opinion of an arduous labour or task, which is as creditable to the author's philological acumen, as it is to his Christian philanthropy.

Tinnevely, 6,5 a 7,5. No transactions but better rates could be obtained for superior qualities. Western, 5 a 5,5. Nothing doing.

COTTON YARN.—\$24 a \$28. Nothing doing. Stock large.

FEAD.—A few transactions have taken place, but sales are made with great difficulty.

LONG CLOTHS.—Wh. \$3,10 a 3,40, Grey \$2,50 a 2,70. A few parcels of Grey's and White's have found purchasers. Stock moderate in this quarter, but equal to the demand.

OPUM.—Patna \$840, Malwa \$790, Benares \$810. Owing to the approaching departure of the Orange Junks for Peking, there has been more animation in the market for considerable sales of Malwa have been made \$750 a 790 and some Bengal drug has also changed hands at our quotation.

RICE.—The Late Rains, have caused a decline in Foreign grain.

SANDALWOOD.—No Sales are reported. The late upward tendency in this article seems to be checked.

STEEL.—No Sales. The Stock in Chinese hands is large.

TIN.—\$14. Purchases have been made, demand moderate.

TIN PLATES.—The Stock is sufficient, the importation of a considerable quantity would cause a decline.

Woolen Goods.—No demand. The supply is moderate.

Hyson.—The Stock is small—nothing doing.

SUMMARY OF SYDNEY NEWS TO 10 AUG. 1843.

The elections for Members of the new Legislative Council had terminated satisfactorily—most of the Candidates returned, being Men of character and standing in the Colony.—The Council had met, but were occupied with bye laws and regulations.

Trade continued dull several large failures lately having taken place and others anticipated, Credit, for the time, was quite destroyed. The Bank were limiting their discounts to Bills at a short date.—Five Banks were closed as Banks of issue, discount or deposit.—One (the Bank of Australia) having lent their capital upon mortgages principally over property belonging to the Directors, had merged into a loan Company.—The other (the Sydney Bank) of a limited capital, had met with severe losses through the incapacity of the Manager, and the Directors had determined to wind up.—The two English Banks appear gradually to monopolize the Banking business of the Colony, from their large capital and excellent management possessing the confidence of the community.

Teas were dull of Sale at for Hyson Skin £4: 15 to £3 pr. Chest.—Congou £6 to £8: 10 pr. chest.—Various articles of China and Indian production had been, shipped to London.

The exports of the Colony increase rapidly, while the imports are much diminished.—In consequence of the number of flock that had been boiled down for the Tallow, Sheep had risen in value.—Beef of an excellent quality was about being shipped to England; Hides, Bark and Cedar were all shipped to some extent.

The present distress appears to call forth the real resources of the Colony, and with the destruction of the Speculation, commercial and agricultural, we may expect in a few years to see the Colony flourishing on a more stable foundation.

The "North Star" frigate, was sent down to New Zealand with troops shortly after her arrival, some disturbance having occurred among the Natives.

By the Barque *British Isle*, sixty day from Sydney, we learn that intelligence had been received of the arrival of *H. M. Ship Porpoise* at Tahiti. The Capt. Sir *Troup Nicholas*, finding the French Flag flying, immediately caused it to be hauled down, and forthwith sent his first Lieutenant to England with despatches. We have seen no Newspapers giving corroborative particulars of the foregoing information, consequently ignorant of the facts of the case; however, we much err if this decisive act of Sir T. Nicholas does not cause a great sensation at home, and revive all the bitter warlike sermony recently evinced by the Thiers party against Great Britain.

GOVERNMENT NOTIFICATION.

THE annexed Extracts from Communications (public and private) addressed by His Excellency, Keying Imperial Commissioner &c. to Her Majesty's Plenipotentiary &c. in China, under dates the 25th of September and 8th of October 1843; and the reply made to the latter on the 12th of October, are published for general information.

By Order of His Excellency Her Britannic Majesty's Plenipotentiary, Chief Superintendent of Trade, &c. in China.

RICHARD WOOSNAM.

Government House, Victoria, Hong-Kong, October 24th, 1843.

EXTRACTS.

25th September, 1843.

"It is to be observed that the Sea Coasts of Keang-soo &c. (that is the Coasts situated between the Tahea, or Ningpo, and Yang-tse-kiang Rivers) is without any shelter on the Outside [towards the South and East] and has a number of soft sand flats, or mud banks, which shift frequently when the South East winds blow violently, thereby rendering losses by shipwreck very easy. This consideration induces me to make this communication" (regarding the loss of the Schooner Levant Packet) "to the Honorable Plenipotentiary, and to beg him to direct all Merchant Vessels to take exceeding great care, and to engage Pilots. This is most important!"

8th October, 1843.

"Seventhly. Along the Coast of Keangnan and Chekeang are very many quicksands. They are at times visible and at times invisible. Your merchant Ships have not much sailed thereabouts, and it is to be feared, that many losses may occur. I hope therefore, that you will enjoin great prudence and precaution on your merchants, and will likewise inform the foreign Merchants of all Nations of this fact, as it concerns much valuable merchandize, and many human lives. This is most important!"

"Ninthly. The people living along our Coast are prone to insult and abuse the ignorant. Now the black Sailors on board your Ships are generally, by nature, ignorant and fond of liquor. They should on no account be permitted to go on shore to drink and get intoxicated, lest they be ill used by our people."

12th October, 1843.

"Your friendly and benevolent hints regarding our black people not being allowed to go on shore and get intoxicated, thereby exposing themselves to possible ill usage and insult from the people (of the Sea Coast) of China, and your still more important and benign suggestions as to the necessity that exists for all foreign navigators on the Coasts of Keangnan and Chekeang proceeding with great care and precaution, claim my grateful acknowledgments in the name not only of England, but of all other civilized Nations. I will issue a Notification on both points, in order that your goodness and forethought may be universally known, and acted upon."

ROBBERIES.—These on account of the dark nights, and the paucity of Constables have again become common but perhaps the most absurd one, was the breaking into a Billiard Room in the Queen's Road, and where the Coolees of the room were sleeping. Here they succeeded in packing up the chairs, and were only heard when all the Billiard Lamps had been taken down. It is supposed that the jingling of the lamps awakened the Coolees, who immediately got up and called for assistance. The robbers however made their escape, but from the appearance of the room, it was clear that in a few minutes more, there would have been neither chairs, nor lamps, although it is presumed that the chairs would have remained, whatever might have been the fate of the billiard cues.

Another feature in this case is, that the man up to the time he was detected bore as good a character, as any China-man on the Island; besides he was well-skilled in both the Chinese and English Languages.

A little before sunset the Culprit was paraded down the Queen's Road from prison to the place of punishment. He was dressed exactly as a European. White hat jacket and trousers, but his tail being cut off, we suppose at the time of his conversion he walked surrounded by police but not in bonds (it is usual with a culprit in China to be held by his tail, formed from the hair of his head.) At the place of punishment there were already on his arrival an immense crowd of at least 40 Europeans, 200 Lascars, and nearly 400 Chinese. The usual "man of the rattan" did not officiate, but a European who did not strike him the blow half so severe as the usual r. d. would have done.

After the Culprit received his quota, he was walked back to prison, the crowd dispersed with not the slightest appearance of commiseration for the man. The reason is evident. The Chinese were pleased to see the man who had abjured their religion punished, and the English were displeased to see one who professed Christianity in Victoria to the degree he had done, become such a hypocrite.

The Housebreaking part of the business seems now however to be partially stopped and this in a great measure owing to the Authorities having destroyed all the mat-sheds or hovels, which were nothing but nests of banditti.

The beggars have nearly all disappeared, but this is not to be wondered at as several bands of them under charge of the police passed our door last week on the way to the boats that were to convey them to their native dear and flowery land.
