The extent of the damage done is very great, upwards of 1700 houses have been burnt down; Punhoyquas Hong is down, Okl Aming and Young Tom (the Linguist) are burnt out; also Hopmow, Le Chun and all the other shops in Mowqua Street. The extent of the damage is estimated at \$5,000,000. The British-have not lost heavily except in furniture and dousestic matters; but every one knows inconvenience is not paid for under the new Regime. The appearance of the fire was grand and terrific, had not the wind providentially changed to the northward and eastward every fareign house in Canton would have been burnt down, but with the change of wind and exertions of the men from the Dido, and some American Ship's Crews the fire was got completely under on Wednesday forenoon; from enquiries it appears there is every reason to believe that its origin was accidental.

Robbers. —Although the Midnight depredators have ceased their usual activity still there have been several attempts at forcibly entering houses during the last few days. Mesers MacVicars stores were broken into on Wednesday Morning last week, and some considerable property taken away but in no other instance laterly have the robbers carried off any hooty. The most remarkable case lately is that attempt upon the house of Major Grant where three of the robbers were pursued and one of them mortally wounded by the sword of his pursuer. His dead body was found next day and a Coroters inquest gave a verdict of justifiable homicide. In the absence of particulars of the evidence produced, which have not been furnished ithough rejectably requested, we cannot estimate from the case calls for farther enquiry.

On Thursday forenoon the Victualling department under charge of Mr. Mc. Knight was robbed of some ropes, hoops two, by one of the Coolies employed there, but he was caught soon after, and the same afternoon received thirty stockes of the bamboo and then turned off the Island. In reference to this robbery we would remark that it is a lamentable thing to see the property of the Crown, so unprotected as it is, in this Island, more than that, it is an inducement to those miserable wretches to steal. All the Crown sores here are badly protected or rather not protected at all; look to the Victualling department, there are their to proper walls, nor guards, in det nothing but a Coolie or two, and with the greatest vigilance the Superintendent can bestow, he cannot prevent frequent robberies. On the evening of the same day a Coolie was caught robbing Mr. Boulle of his empty bottles, and on Saturday the 19th about 2 O'cleek of the day Capt. Edwards was robbed by his own Coolie of Silver plate to the Amounit of nearly forty pounds Stering.



### SHIPS NEWS.

SHIPS NEWS.

The French frigates Erigore, Capt. Cecile, and Cleopatra Capt. Roy, on their passage across from Manila [which they left on the 3rd October] encountered very severe weather.

On the morning of the 9th it came on to blow strong from the N.E., at 2 P. M., the wind veered to North, increasing rapidly; at 4 O clock it bleve a hurricane, carrying away file fore-stayesil of the Erigone. She was nearly thrown on her beam ends, her lee beliwarks were under water for 30 minutes before by the exertions of her officers and crew, she righted. Her rudder was found to be badly damaged. On the 12th in sight of the Taya islands [off Hainan] we were obliged to anchor to avoid being driven amongst the dangerous reefs and shoals in Junk Passage. After being employed for 4 days refitting arrived in Macao Roads on the 21st.

It is said that Captain Cecile will leave the Erigone and proceed to Manila in the Cleopatra to take command of the French squadron, to be stationed in the Chinese and Indian seas: it will be composed of the La Sirene 60 gun, Cleopatra 50, frigates; three Sloops of war, the L'Alemène, La Sabine and La Victorieus.
