Major, General D'Aguilar and Lady have gone to Macao in the Driver. We regret to hear that Mrs. D'Aguilar has been indisposed and visits Macao with a view to recover her

health.

It is rumoured in town that the Anonyma has been on the coast for several days, having the April mail on board. The Celestial is said to have been sent out for the owner's letters, who, from the Driver sailing so appropriately will thus be enabled to answer their correspondents a month earlier than any other house in China, and make favorable operations in this, the Bombay, and London Markets. We are told that vessels belonging to this firm on their arrival do not come direct into port. They signalize with the Bungalow on the hill, and receive ingructions for their future movements. In the present instance they have made a beautiful hit, though we doubt whether this procedure is exactly in accordance with British maritime laws. One thing is certain, that were the harbour regulations duly enforced, the Celestial could not have gone out for the mail without giving twenty four hours intimation. We give this merely as an on dit; as merchants, were we in a similar position, we might do the same, His Excellency, the Governor, however, may be of a different opinion on this subject,

may be of a different opinion on this subject.

This Imperial Commissioner, Keying, had an interview with His Excellency Mr. Cushing, the American Plenipotentiary, at Macao, on Tuesday. The meeting we believe was more one for an exchange of civilities between the representatives of two great powers than of a business nature. The details of Mr. Cushing's diplomatic negotiations were most probably not introduced at the first introduction, but will form the subject of future interviews. His Excellency's suite, with Commodore Parker, and a large number of officers belonging to the American squadron, were presented to Keying, who deported himself with that perfect urbanity and dignity which are so marked in this distinguished Chinese Stateman. We anticipate that the arrangement entered into between the United States and China will be satisfactory to both powers, and that the friendship which has so long subsisted between their respective constries will be consolidated by the personal acquaintance of their representatives. America will ask for no greater concessions than have boen made to other nations and China cannot refuse her less

Council; and Legal Adviser; CaptainsOrmsly, of the 98th, A. D. C., and Mr. Gordon, the Colonist. Surveyor-General, who proceeds to England on sick certificate. With the exception of Captain Ormsly, it is not probable that any of the party will ever again visit China. We have had occasion frequently to oppose their measures, and expose their weaknesses; we would now, in all sincerity, wish them a pleasant voyage to their native land; and, if they still seek after public employment, appointments in other colonies where the inhabitants may think more highly of their merits than our fellow-colonists have done.

Mr. Thomas Scales, the Deputy Postmaster, has, in a small way, made himself quite a conspicuous character, during the few months he has been in China. By a series of illegal exactions, insolence, and inattention to the duties of his humble, but important situation, he has thoroughly disgusted all classes of the community. We are aware of so many of the man's eccentricities, that we were almost prepared for anything, but we certainly were a little surprised, and not a little anused, to hear that he had refused to receive His Excellency's despatches for England ex Driver. This was the climax of all Mr. Scales' absurdities; he had already in every possible way disobliged the mercantile community, whose letters are not of less importance than those from Government House, and they had no redress; clatted with his own achievements he must break a lance with the representative of royalty. On the 19th, a box containing despatches for Her Majesty's Government was sent by the Honorable Colonial-Secretury to Mr. Thomas Scales, with orders to get a receipt for it. The Postmaster pointedly refused to receive the box at all, and upon the Cooloie's pressing the matter, threatened to bamboo him. The box went back to Government House, no doubt, to the great astonishment of His Excellency, who very properly though this flagrant insult should not be allowed to pass unpunished. A sergeant's guard was sent to the Post-office, with orders to present the box at the window, and should they refuse to take it in, to break open the doors, place the box in the office, make a capture of the Deputy, and in the event of his refusal to sign a receipt, to convey him up to Government House. The sergeant was told the box could not be received, and, no doubt, delighted with his commission, the gallant sergeant stormed and carried the Post-office, capturing the Postmaster himself. Before they were dispersed no fewer than twenty roands were fired, and but for the prudence of keeping their position upon the narrow path before mentioned, the police would have been cut off to a man. They came prepared with scaling ladders, pick axes, &c., quite prepared for a determined attack. Their spears were of sufficient length to reach the windows of the Godown, and prevent the watchmen inside from firing upon them. The robbers are evidently in ignorance of the strength of the Treasury in which all valuables are kept; even if they were freely admitted, and allowed to do so unopposed, they would not be able to cut through the thick granite walls for hours, when, under any circumstances, assistance would be procured from the fleet or military.

Much has been done to clear the island of the lawless hordes who infest it, but much more is required. The police establishment, though too small in number for the arduous duties they have to perform, are vigilant and, zealous in protecting person and property; but until the island is cleared of many thousand of its lawless inhabitants, it is impossible entirely to suppress those daring attempts, so many of which are recorded in our columns. The number of labourers is altogether disproportioned to the demands of the colony, or many of them prefer idleness to work, as they are to be see loitering about an all directions. No sooner was this done than the whole party inside were assailed with showers of bricks, from which they were compelled to take flight in a boat and seek refuge at the consulate.

On Monday there was a second riot at the American gardens. The mob collected there, and on being driven out of the garden, they resorted to bricks and mud, which were thrown at all who come in their way. Colonital Manufacturas.—Measrs. Fisher and Donaldson, of the Stockton Factory, Newcastle, have favoured us with a sample of cloth manufactured by them, which is of a very superior description, and as it becomes known will doubtless meet with a ready sale in Sydaey, both for home consumption and exportation. The Stockton Factory is, we understand, capable of producing almost any extent of cloth that may be required; and although at present Measrs. F. and D. only employ shout fifty hands (the majority being women and children), they expect to have additional machinery in a very short time, which will enable them to employ four times the number of persons they do now, and in course of time to manufacture for the Chinese market. At present, however, the colonial market consumes all they can make, and the densand is increasing, and likely-to-increase. We look forward to the time, and we do not think its very distant, when we shall export to China as much cloth of colonial manufacture as will pay for the tea we require from that country; and the best way to hasten that time is by encouraging, by all the means in our power, the use of colonnal cloth, and thus, by adding to the profits, increase the efficiency of the colonial manufacture.

VAN DIEMEN'S LAND.

They state that their exports for the year will be in wool, £19,000; in oil £75,000; in whalebone, £18,000; and in grain at 3s. per bushel, and sundries £116,000; and they rely on a Commissariat expenditure of £350,000, in addition to their exports. At the same time the settlers are cautiobted against holding back their grain, as they did in former times, and suffered for M, in the hope of genting higher prices than Sidney buyers are now giving. It is said that the Commissariat, will require about 150,000 bushels of wheat in the course of the year.
