There is a report in town—brought by the Lanrick—that Sir Edward Belcher has been severely wounded by the natives of Borneo. There is nothing improbable in this, as the Samurang is known to be surveying the East Coast of that Island, It is to be hoped that the piracial inhabitants of the seaboard will not go unpunished much longer, nor Mr. Murray's death be unrevenged. There is overy reason to believe that, inland, the populace are quiet and orderly, and that if the bays and entrances to the Cot, and other rivers, were cleared of the and orderly, and that if the bays and chtrances to sheCot, and other rivers, were cleared of the pirates who have settled there; and committed so many depredations upon European shipping, a lucrative trade might be opened up with Borneo, beneficially for the natives as well as for Foreigners engaged in it.

To-night Signor Dalle Casse and company make their last appearance before the public of Hongkong, being for the benefit of the young ladies. The Signor has been rather unfortunate in his attempts to enunse; his own sickness, the sewere accident which deprived him of the services of the Signorita Anna, and the inclemency of the weather, have all conspired to make his visit to Hongkong less profitable than he might have been led to expect, to-night however we expect he will have "a bumper" to console him for past disappointment. ment.

The picarcons of Hongkong appear to know no distinction; on Thursday the representative of royalty itself was robbed of two gold watches, a gold medal, and other articles which are prized by His Excellency, as well for their intrinsic value, as from their being parts of his personal equipment, and in daily use. The medal, is an honorary distinction, and its loss consequently more to be regretted. We hear there is a probability of the rogues being detected, and that the servants at Government house are not altogether cleared from suspicion.

From Canton dates are to the 9th. The city was quiet, it being understood that Keying and Mr. Forbes, the American Consul, had settled the affair of shooting the Chinaman last month. The floods have extended to the interior farther than was anticipated, in many instances entire villages being swept away, and hundreds of the inhabitants drowned. In addition to the damage done the rose and sike crop, it is feared that the tea in ahat district has also suffered materially. Business continues dull, and the factories still flooded.

The result of the land sales on Tuesday is highly sallifactory, proving that the value of building ground in Hongkong is by no means featious. The sales are all long fals transactions, entered into by prudent men knowing the terms under which they acquired property, and who, it is presumed in nearly all instances, have finds to cover the ground with buildings to the value of three times the annual ground resit, within the allotted twelve months. We were not prepared for the prices which were offered, and the keen competition for the marine lots, some of which, at a considerable distance from town, could only be valuable to gettlemen in their immediate vicinity. It is certainly a subject of congratulation to find that all classes, from the principal mercantile houses downwards, were anxious to secure property, even at 100 per cent. advance on the upset price. People at a distance will understand that it is not a mere mania for speculation, all of the lots are purchased to be immediately built upon, and as we have observed, with one or two exceptions they will be built upon within the year. The result of this sale adds £2,311 to the revenue of the colony, this, with former sales, will bring the total land revenue in itself, and under judicious management, it will go a great way to defray the expenditure

The Vien ran alongside, and took out all her armament, 16 guns and 400,32 lb. shot, and it was not until relieved of this weight that she again floated; without this assistance she had no other alternative than to throw her guns overboard, or go to pieces on the bank. This is a clear case of salvage, and before any Admirtally court the sum awarded the Vien for her aid would be considerable. Now, I ask any man on earth whether the inference is not inevitable, that Government, when it published the above draft, did not consider the oath heretofere taken by the Sepoy as binding him to proceed beyond its own territories—and that it does not consider him now liable to be called on to proceed beyond its own territories—and that it does not consider him now liable to be called on to proceed on board ship, unless he has specially enlisted with that understanding and taken a specific oath to that effect!
