A mail for England via Bombay, per Clipper ANTELOPE, will be closed at this Office at 5 P. M. to-day. Post Office, 25th September, 1844.

The annual meeting of the Morrison Education Society will be held this afternoon at half past five o'clock.

We are compelled to defer until Saturday, a more lengthened notice of the Ordinance which places us again under the laws of England. In the meantime, we cannot avoid stating that, after a very careful perusal of the document, we are satisfied that the court is a complete one, and will answer every purpose. The ordinance itself is admirably drawn up of great length, but clear and distinct on every point.

We have also to apologise to our Portuguese friends in Macao, for the absence of the second chapter of their history. We have not forgotten them, and when nothing important offers itself to our attention, we will wile away an hour, in giving a sketch of their present unhappy condition and enquiring into the causes.

The Colonial Chaplain estimates in the Register of yesterday that, until further notice, service will commence on Sunday at 5. r. m.

We are happy to hear, that the Reverend gentleman has so far recovered, as to be able to resume his pious labours.

CANTON.

The intelligence from this city is of a rather alarming nature. Two firms have leased building allotments on the site of the old factories, and have been clearing away the rubbish preparatory to building. This does not meet the approbation of the mob, and anonymous placards have been posted, threatening the contractors with death if they build for the foreigners, also the destruction of the houses. It is but too probable, that the ruffians will keep their word, and the property, or even the lives of the obnoxious strangers be endangered. In the event of a riot there is fortunately a strong force of French and American ships-of-war in the river; we have also a brig-of-war and a large mercantile fleet at Whampoa, who will probably be quite able to protect our countrymen. We would not, however, be surprised, should the Captain of the Iris move his frigate from this harbour to Whampoa, or even off the city of Canton; and in the event of a riot, we hope the celestials will feel her metal.

Our readers would be rather surprised, to see two ordinances of Government, published officially in our last paper; certainly we were rather astonished, as the day before publication, such a contingency was never dreamt of by us. We hear that our contemporary of the Register, has declined publishing these documents; and hence the cause of their being sent to us: It has been known for some time, that a press, types, and printer were on their way from England, to establish a Government Gazette in Hongkong, and until their arrival it is probable—though of this we know nothing—that our columns may be the medium of laying official documents before the public. Should such be the case, it will not make the slightest difference in our sentiments—at has been our earnest desire, in our own humble way, to advocate the true interests of the colony, and to deal justly by every man, whether in the employment of Government or not, and in this respect we will ever continue unchanged.

Under the vigorous, yet paternal sway, of our respected Lieutenant Governor, a new era has dawned upon the colony. In every direction, we see the long talked of plans of public improvement, progressing at a satisfactory pace. The Queen's road has already assumed a respectable appearance—drains are being formed streets laid out, and barracks for the Sepoy troops, as well as officers' quarters, erected. The new China-bazaar is also building up fast; the old one which disfigured the town is entirely swept away, and more respectable houses will soon occupy its site. In the police department, we hear there is to be an addition to the night watch, lately formed. It is proposed to extend their boundaries, from the west end of the lower bazaar, to the Albany Godowns. We notice also with much satisfaction, the European police, driving away the idle blackguards who are usually to be found in all parts of the town, with stalls of fruit, and dice for gambling. The summary justice of a Penang lawyer, is the proper way to deal with these gentry, and the numerous vagrants who have been permitted to locate themselves in the vicinity of the town. The Supreme Court—after a most unseasonably delay—opens on the 1st of next month for the trial of prisoners; after the criminal business is closed, civil suits will have a hearing. In the meantime, His Honour, the Chief Justice, has assumed the functions of office, and attends to such applications as are usually made to a Judge at Chambers.

We are sincerely rejoiced to see our rulers fairly awake to the necessity of public improvements. Much requires to be done, to ameliorate the climate, and render the place fit for the residence of the "Merchant Princes" of China, as well as the members of Government, and the other Europeans, civil and military, who sojourn on the Island. We trust the government will not tire of their own good works, and take to napping again—if they do, we must beat gongs, bannobos and rattles, to arouse them, even if we incur the penalties provided for the offence, by Legislative wisdom No. 18 of 1844.

We do not suppose that the Lieutenant Governor places any undue value upon popularity; but we doubt not, it must be gratifying for him to know, that his countrymen in China, appreciate his character and are not blind to his merits, both as a Commander, feeling a paternal solicitude for the troops under his charge, and as a Governor taking a lively interest in the welfare of the colony he governs.

The Monthly Overland Mail from London, 8th July, arrived on the 21st, ex Myraman Djarum, and through the assiduity of Mr. Spring, the Postmaster, was delivered the same day. The Honourable Company's Steam Frigate, Akbar, carried the mail and passengers from Aden in seven days eight hours, where they had been transferred by the Cleopatra, which vessel left Suez on the 23rd. The time from London to Bombay was twenty-eight days and a few hours, being the most expeditious transit on record.

The intelligence brought by this month's mail is on the whole satisfactory. Tea, our principal export from China, has receded even from the former low rates. This has been expected, and coupled with the continued large shipments, which we are compelled to make, in order to encourage the consumption of British manufactures, will, we trust, convince the

ministry of the necessity for a reduction of the high duties on an article which is alike required for the rich man and the poor. Out of 50,000 packages offered for sale by public auction in June, only 9,000 were sold at extremely low rates. Common Congous (actual sales) are quoted at 11d. equal to 18 taels in Canton, where none of the new crop has been sold under 34, and for the best chops 41 taels have been given, the herb costing in England, with all charges, not less than 2s. In Silk there have been few transactions, a fall in price being expected. The shipments of Cotton Goods to China go on vigorously, but they can only find a profitable market, by enabling our merchants to make returns in produce. Of plain Calicoes, there were shipped from England in June to Calcutta 8,678,885 yards; Bombay 8,300,100; Singapore 1,761,212; China 7,522,161 Yards, and in the previous month close upon 13,000,000, or about equal to the entire shipment of this description of goods to both Calcutta and Bombay. It was calculated by Mr. Thom—no mean Judge of such matters—when engaged with the Chinese Commissioners in drawing up the new tariff, that the entire import of Calicoes, British and American, amounted annually to 1,350,000 pieces. Taking May and June as an average of the shipments from England, they would now amount to 3,063,333 pieces from that country alone, or an increase of two hundred per cent upon previous exports, and that when the home consumption of tea is nearly stationary. That all these goods, and more, could find a market there is not the slightest question, but if that market is to be a profitable one, it must be an exchange of commodities, and unless the duty on teas is greatly reduced, it will be found, that exchanges have already been made at ruinous rates, such as most inevitably check shipments.

The quarterly return of the revenue, published on the 5th of July, is satisfactory. So long as this is the case, particularly when the customs' department shows an increase, there is sure evidence of the prosperity of the country. The net increase on the quarter as compared with that ending 5th July last year is £418,574; of this the customs' appropriate £312,000. The increase on the year as compared with last year is £2,000,000 Sterling.

The Bill, making important alterations in the duties on foreign sugar, the produce of free labour, has passed, after a rather stormy opposition. The ministry appears were in a considerable minority upon this question, and a resignation, or dissolution of parliament was even talked of. Their friends, and it is even said some of their opponents, rallied round them and this important measure was finally carried by a triumphant majority of 22. Whether, in the event of Sir Robert Peel's resignation, the Whigs would have again come into office we know not, but it is to be hoped such a deplorable event is far distant. A coalition Administration may ultimately be formed, between the more moderate of the Tory party, and the least rapacious and insincere of the Whigs, but that will be the work of years. The genuine unlearned old Tories with all their virtues and weaknesses are gradually sinking into the tomb, and a race equally loyal, though far more liberal, supplying their place in the Legislature of Great Britain. Sir Robert Peel appears to be a man at least twenty years in advance of his party. A sound conservative, he is at the same time well aware that, however laudable and necessary many branches of our national institutions may have been in their day, happily by a more general diffusion of learning and knowledge, they can now be loosed off without doing any injury to the trunk—servants of God may return to their pious duties, and leave the stormy field of political strife, to the hereditary legislators of the land and the chosen representatives of the people.

Ireland is quiet—comparatively quiet. O'Connell, a resident of the penitentiary, receives his friends, and declares himself happy. A deputation from the corporation of Dublin in thirteen carriages, and another deputation from the city of Cork, on application at the Penitentiary were refused admission, the Governor of the prison informing them, that he could not in the discharge of his orders, admit a deputation to present an address to a prisoner. O'Connell has declined the appointment of Mayor of Dublin for 1845. Lord De Grey has resigned the Viceroypahip and is succeeded by Lord Heytesbury.

Much excitement has been caused by the disclosure of a system of post office espionage, which at present is very uncalculated for, and at any time is very un-English. The parties whose letters were opened are foreigners, but the reasons for such an illiberal action are unknown. It is surmised that Sir James Graham, at the instigation of the Austrian Government, took the responsibility upon himself of issuing orders to open letters passing through the post office addressed to these Gentlemen. This has made him very unpopular, not the less so, that the Duke of Wellington has declared that this was done without consulting the other members of the administration. The matter has been referred to a secret committee of both houses. The press, Tory and Whig, are indignant at the prying inquisitorial conduct of the Home Secretary, which the Times characterizes as combining the tyranny of a Louis Quatorze with the cowardice of a Jerry Sneak and the meanness of a Marplot.

The question of steam communication with India and China has made some advance. The monthly line to Bombay continues in the hands of the Company, but a second monthly line from Suez to Ceylon and Calcutta, with a

branch to the Straits and China, is to be carried out by a private company. The expense is not to exceed £170,000 per annum, of which Her Majesty's Government will defray one half.

The Emperor of Russia has returned to his own country, after a short visit to Queen Victoria. He made a vain attempt to conciliate John Bull, by a lavish expenditure of money and the presentation of valuable gifts. His Highness offered \$500 in aid of the funds to be realized by the Polish ball, which the Lady patronesses refused to accept. After paying all expenses the ball left a fund of £1,000 for relief of the distressed refugees.

In looking over our file of papers we do not see one word regarding China, further than a notice of the arrival of another instalment of the indemnity money.

We publish a few extracts, with such information regarding shipping and commerce as we can glean from the material afforded us.

COMMERCIAL INTELLIGENCE.

The East India Company have announced that their rate of exchange on Bengal and Madras is fixed for the present at 1s 10d, and upon Bombay at 1s 10 1/2d per Company's rupee. The Lords of the Treasury have directed the Commissioners of Customs to be apprised that Mysore produce is legally admissible as produce of Madras.

A British Consul appointed for Manila, proceeds to his destination by the July mail; and arrangements have been made, which will take effect immediately after the arrival of that mail in the east, under which there will be the three ports of Java to which foreign vessels have access—namely, Batavia, Samarang, and Sourabaya—persons duly authorized to certify the origin of Java sugar in the manner required by the Sugar Duties Bill.

Cassia Loxea has been in demand for the better qualities, but the low, mid, and old have been bought in at a decline of from 1s to 2s. The prices realized have been for fine 68s to 70s, good mid 62s to 66s, mid 63s to 65s, low mid 58s to 59s, ord. and coarse 51s 6d to 55s, broken 48s to 50s. Stock 9,170 chs, against 9,478 in 1843. Cinnamon has not been much enquired for, and prices remain as before. Stock: Ceylon 2136 lbs, and 44 Malabar 1330 lbs, and 65 chs, against Ceylon 904 lbs, and 96 chs, and Malabar 1359 lbs, and 50 chs, in 1843.

Ivory.—At public sale the rates paid were rather under those previously given: Fine large East India teeth went from 27l to 29l 15s; second sizes, 25l to 26l 10s; small sorts, 9l to 22l; African 14l to 27l per cwt.

Opium.—Turkey is quoted 6s 6d to 10s.

Piece Goods.—Corahs: At the last public sales, 95,000 pieces were brought forward, and nearly the whole sold. The bulk of the goods were decidedly inferior to those previously imported; so there was a good competition for those of standard quality, which brought 16s to 16s 6d; fair sold at 15s to 15s 6d; common, 14s to 14 1/2d; coarse bad, 10s 8d to 11s. Stock 150,000 against 193,000 in 1843.—Bandannoes: The supply of Canary and Chocolate Bandannoes being very great the prices have declined; extensive purchases for the United States gave support to prices in the sales.—Choppahs: The quantity offered was very moderate, and previous prices were fully maintained; some of low quality are required. Stock of Bandannoes and Choppahs 27,220 against 29,350 in 1843.—Tussore Silk Cloth: There was a good demand, but prices were rather lower than last sale.—Pongee Silk: About 1,000 pieces of pretty good were offered and sold at a slight improvement upon previous rates. A few of rather common quality, sold at 43s to 45s 6d.—Pongee Silk Handkerchiefs: There were no plain offered, but the figured white were all sold, and also a few crimson of good quality; other colours of various quality, sold at improved rates.—Crape Shawls: The quantity put up to sale was 1700 plain, and 9,000 damasked, of which nearly the whole were sold at 8s 6d to 9s 6d; a few of 8s 2d, brought 10s 6d to 12s; the white were preferred.—White Longcloths of good quality were bought in. Stock 4743 against 7626 in 1843.—Blue Sallampores: As the stock in first hands was small, rather improved rates were obtained; the demand was chiefly for the lower qualities. Stock, blue, 63,000 against 118,000 in 1843; white, 480 against 5,700 in 1843.—Madras Handkerchiefs: These offered, which were chiefly old goods, were little inquired for. In China, little has been done, the trade looking for reduction in prices. Turkey and Persia have had a further decline of 6d. By private contract considerable business has been done, but at rates favourable to the purchaser. All descriptions of Congou, except fine Ho Flows, are difficult of sale. In consequence of supplies, fine Greens have declined. Scattered Orange Pekoes have become scarce. MANCHESTER.

The market has been dull during the last month, and in Shirtings or Fine Long Cloths 2-

reed gold tends, which, in April, were sold at 11s to 11s 1/4, are now 10s; and during the same period 64 to 66 reeds have declined about 6d to 9d per piece. 30-inch Shirtings have remained almost stationary. 20-inch Printing Cloths are scarce, and have advanced fully 1/2d per piece. Grey Domestics are in good demand. There has been a reduction of fully 1/2d per piece in the prices of 6-4ths low Jacquets from 2s 6d to 2s 3d; but the better qualities are scarce, and prices firm. In Twist for India and China there has been less doing, and assortments of Mule may be bought on rather better terms. Water Twist 5-24 is in demand, and prices firm; the higher numbers 30-36 are also in greater request, and held in some instances at 1/2d to 1/4d advance. In Cotton there has been an advance of 1/4d on the lower and middling classes of American.

PRELIMINARY MISCELLANEOUS EVENTS.

Her Majesty has appointed Serjeant Goulburn to be one of the Commissioners of the Court of Bankruptcy in London, in the place of John Herman Merivale, Esq., deceased. At a Common Hall, held for the election of sheriffs for London and Middlesex, Alderman William Hunter and Mr. Thomas Sydney of Ludgate Hill, were unanimously elected. Mr. William Burton Newenham has been tried at the Old Bailey and found guilty of the abduction of Frances Louisa Wortham, a ward of Chancery, and sentenced to two years' imprisonment. A literary gentleman, named Belaney, has been committed to Newgate, charged with the murder of his wife, by administering to her a quantity of prussic acid. The prisoner stated that he had accidentally placed some prussic acid in a glass, which his wife, while his back was turned, mistaking for water, unhappily swallowed, but this fact he did not disclose till long after her death. The deceased and her husband appeared to have lived on the most affectionate terms. On the eve of the departure of Mr. and Mrs. Belaney from North Sunderland, from whence they came, they each made a will, bequeathing the whole of the property they possessed to each other, in the event of one surviving the other. On the very day his wife died, he wrote a letter to Mr. Bell, his clerk, stating that his wife was dangerously ill, and attended by two physicians, although she had not been visited by any medical gentleman, and on the 9th he wrote another letter to the same person, stating that his wife was dead, but giving no account, or even alluding to the fact of her having taken poison. A church-rate contest has taken place in the parish of All Saints, Northampton. After two days' polling, the parishioners, by a vote of 424 to 292, decided against the rate. The Liverpool Courier is assured, by parties who were witnesses to the fact, that "during the heavy rain which fell on Monday, an immense quantity of pebbles descended upon the Liverpool Exchange flags, and some fell in Castle Street. The pebbles were all small in size, but of different colours and shapes." The Manchester steamer, which left Hull for Hamburg, under the command of Capt. Dailley, on the 10th June, on arriving on the opposite coast, struck on the Marble Sand, on the coast of Hulslein, about twenty-five miles from the shore, during a hurricane, and became a complete wreck. Every soul on board perished. Considerable curiosity has been excited at the St. Katharine's Docks, in consequence of the arrival of a vessel from Bermuda of only 41 tons burden, manned entirely by men of colour, and having a cargo almost entirely of arrow-wood, which has accomplished the voyage in the incredibly short space of 31 days. The will of the late Mr. W. Crockett has been proved. The personal property alone is sworn under the large sum of 200,000l., and it is rumoured that his real estate is worth 150,000l. more. This extraordinary man formerly kept the fishmonger's shop adjoining Temple-bar, and by a series of successful speculations on the turf was enabled to purchase the house in St. James's-street, afterwards terribly famous as "Crockett's," and it was said that there the deceased amassed the bulk of his immense property. Incendiary fires occur nightly in Norfolk, Suffolk, Essex, and Cambridgeshire. The claims of Baron De Bode have been before the Court of Queen's Bench, for the decision of a Jury. The Court was occupied with the subject four days; when the Jury returned a verdict on the points submitted to them. The case, however, is not yet settled, the finding of the Jury being merely as to certain facts, on which they decided after upwards of an hour's deliberation. The Baron De Bode claims as one of those British subjects whose property was illegally confiscated by the Revolutionary tribunals of France, and for whose indemnification seven millions were in 1818 paid over by the French to the English Government. The Jury found all the pleas raised by the Crown against his claim, groundless, therefore the Attorney-General pleaded in bar the statute which limits all actions and suits to within six years of the cause of action arising.

FROM THE LONDON MAIL, JULY 8TH.

Among other matters of general interest we may remark, that the return of the Revenue just published, shows an aggregate increase in the items of Customs, Excise, Stamps, and Taxes over the corresponding quarter in 1843, of 448,573l. The income of the year exceeds that of the preceding year by 2,440,220l. This is most satisfactory. Earl De Grey has retired from the Lord-Lieutenancy of Ireland, and been succeeded by Lord Heytesbury. Sir G. Peel denies the existence of any political difference between the late Vicary and the Cabinet, but it is more than probable his Lordship disapproved of the policy pursued by the Government with respect to Ireland. Literature has lost a distinguished member—Thomas Campbell is no more. The "Bar of Hope" expired at Boulogne after a protracted illness, and was buried at Poets' Corner, in Westminster-Abbey, on the 4th July. The funeral was attended by the Duke of Argyll, Lord Brougham, Lord Aberdeen, Lord Campbell, Lord Stratford, Lord Morpeth, Lord Dudley Coates Stuart, Lord Leigh, Sir R. Peel, the Chief Justice, Sir J. C. Hobhouse, Sir J. Hanmer, Sir J. Macdonald, Sir P. F. Shelley, Right Hon. T. B. Macaulay, Right Hon. R. Peel, and a number of literary characters. A deputation from the Literary Association of Poland

was also present, one of whom carried a small portion of earth from the grave of Kosciuszko, near Cracow, which was cast into the grave of Mr. Campbell.

Whatever was the object of the visit to his tomb, the Emperor of Russia has failed to conciliate the English people. None welcomed his arrival, not even those who shared his bounty, appear to regret his departure. He left London very suddenly on 9th June, and embarked the same afternoon at Woolwich for the continent. This very abrupt termination to his Majesty's visit is attributed to the Polish fête, which was specially fixed for the following evening, as the lady patronesses, though solicited to sanction a postponement, were inexorable. They refused delay, and, what is more, rejected the Emperor's offer of 5000l., transmitted through Baron Brunow. To have accepted it would have been an insult to the Poles, as it is, the sum realised on the occasion, after paying all expenses, exceeded 10000l., though the ball in the previous year produced only 6000l.

As Ministers have abandoned the County Courts Bill, the Irish Legislation and Franchise Bill, the Municipal Corporation Bill, and the Ecclesiastical Courts Bill, Parliament will probably be prorogued early next month, for there remain for discussion only the Bank Charter Bill, the Poor-law Amendment Bill, the Railways Regulation Bill, the Savings Bank Bill, the Presbyterian Marriages Bill, and a few other measures, to which no very material opposition can be anticipated.

The League and their friends are a good deal disappointed at the result of Mr. Villers's motion for a Committee of the whole House to consider a series of resolutions declaring the necessity of an immediate repeal of the Corn-laws, which tend to restrict the supply of food necessary for our increasing population. This, after a debate of two nights, was negatived by a majority of 204. As the majority in 1833 was 256, and in 1842, 303, the question appears to have made some little progress; but the advance is in no degree proportioned to the agitation which has been carried on, and the sums so freely lavished upon it.

The Currency Bill is progressing though Parliament without any alteration in its principle, that of a paper currency convertible and fluctuating as if it were metallic, but with some variation in its details, from the measure originally proposed. Those changes as announced by the Prime Minister on going into Committee upon the Bill, affect chiefly the Country Banks of Issue, and relax in some degree the stringency of the clauses affecting their circulation of notes. The maximum of the issues originally limited to the average of two years preceding the announcement of the new measure, is now fixed at that of the previous quarter, and instead of a week, a month is given for making up the average amount of issues for publication, thus obviating the risk of incurring penalties which a Bank with Branches might incur by the narrower limitations; the period when the Bill shall take effect as to country Banks is extended to the 10th of October next. A correspondence which took place between a number of Bankers and Sir Robert Peel as to reserving a power in the Bill to enable the Bank of England, with consent of certain Crown Officers (the first Lord of the Treasury, the Chancellor of the Exchequer, and the Master of the Mint), to extend their issues upon securities in the event of any particular crisis arising, resulted in a decided negative to give any such power except in the case provided for, the withdrawal of its circulation by any Country Bank.

Several members addressed the House in favour of extending the amount of Bank Issue against securities, and Mr. Muntz pressed to a division his opposition to the measure in toto, but was left in a minority of 18 to 205, so that the Bill must become Law as soon as the necessary forms are disposed of. It is much to be feared the country will, before many years elapse, find the restrictive system now adopted is "a step in the wrong direction."

The Foreign news of the past month is not of very much interest. Hostilities have commenced between France and Morocco. It was hoped that a reconciliation might be effected through the mediation of England, but to this the Emperor refuses to submit. The Duke d'Angoulême died at Goritz, on 3d June. In America the Senate, who were all through averse to President Tyler's project for the annexation of Texas, have rejected his treaty by a large majority. A proposition for extending the civil jurisdiction of the States over the Oregon territory has also been rejected by a large majority.

EAST INDIA INTELLIGENCE.

The Queen has been graciously pleased to appoint George Tradescant Lay, Esq., to be her Majesty's Consul at Amoy; Rutherford Alcock, Esq., to be her Majesty's Consul at Foo-chow-fu; and John William Perry Farren, Esq., to be her Majesty's Consul in the Philippine Islands.

The Portuguese Government have decreed that the trade in those plants known by the name of Orchilla, shall, in all the Portuguese provinces of Africa, be exclusively reserved to the Government; and that two-thirds of the net proceeds of the Orchilla shall be applied to the public service of the African provinces.

A living plant of the Opas Tree has been lately presented to the Horticultural Society by the East India Company, and is now growing in the Chiswick Garden. It is in perfect health, and, notwithstanding the fables of Dutch travellers, perpetuated by Darwin, may be approached with safety. It is, however, so virulent a poison that no prudent person would handle it without proper precaution. Along with it the Company also presented a new species of Cyon, and a young plant of the Durian fruit.

A FEMALE MISSIONARY SETTLEMENT.—A letter from Berlin says, "Our Government has just purchased a vast extent of land in the Peninsula of Malacca, which belonged to Dr. Hoeker, a Prussian Missionary and naturalist, who was assassinated some years ago by banditti in the environs of Calcutta. The property has been sold to the Government at a very high price, the amount of which is not known, but of which 300,000 dollars have already been paid on account. From general report, which deserves a high degree of probability from the characters of the person through whom the bargain has been concluded, those lands in

Malacca are intended to be the seat of the Society of Female Missionaries, the formation of which was proposed some time ago by Baroness Eichhorn, lady of the Minister of Ecclesiastical Affairs and Public Instruction, the object of which is to be the conversion of females to the Christian religion."

NAVAL.

The Fox, 42, Capt. Sir H. M. Blackwood, is residing at Plymouth, and will sail in a few days for the East Indies and China. The Wanderer, 16, arrived at Portsmouth from China on 20th June, and disembarked treasure. On being paid off, the petty officers and ship's company presented their first lieutenant, J. G. Tracy, with a handsome full dress sword, knot, and cocked hat. The Cornwall transport arrived from China at Portsmouth on 10th June. The Cormorant has also arrived from Hongkong. The Childers, 16, Com. Welleley, arrived at Portsmouth from China, on the 3d of July. An immense steamer, to be named the "Terrible," and to be fitted with engines of 800 horse-power, is now building at Deptford. A grand naval review is to take place in September, in presence of her Majesty and of the King of the French. The fleet will probably be composed of the following ships:—St. Vincent, 120, Admiral Sir C. Rowley, Capt. R. Rowley; Caledonia, 120, Capt. A. Milne; Queen, 110, Capt. Martin; Camperdown, 105, Sir C. Sullivan; Albion, 90, Capt. N. Lockyer; Collingwood, Capt. H. Eden; Amazon and Deilaus, frigates raised to corvettes; Flying Fish, Mine, Daring, Osprey, and Espiegle, new class brigs of 12 guns; Cruiser, 16, Pantaloon, 10, Waterwitch, 10, and a number of steam-vessels. The Prince de Joinville has presented Capt. Hall with a case of beautiful pistols, in acknowledgment of the high gratification he has received from the perusal of his book, the "Voyages, &c. of the Nemesis."
