There is a report in Macao that Keying has been recalled and degraded three steps; it is also said that the Emperor has abdicated in favor of a near relation. We give this as a mere rumour, but if true it is probably intended to precede some bold political movement. Sanches, and his Negro associate, who murdered the crew of the Falcon, were tried and condemned at Macao on the 30th ult.; but whether the sentence will be carried into execution at Macao or Goa is unknown. Recently in mentioning the intended tax upon house rent in the "holy city" we made a serious mistake in the amount -for \$7,200, the annual amount of revenue which might be derived from a tax of 10 per cent on rental, read \$72,000.

A public meeting was held on Saturday as advertised in the papers. The main object of the meeting, was to afford the inhabitants, an opportunity of expressing their approbation, or disapprobation, of the measures adopted by the committee, who were empowered to memo. rialize his Excellency and council on the Registration Ordinance. The resolution of approval made by Mr. Fletcher, was carried unanimously, there not being one dissentient voice. It is true that after this resolution was passed, a proposal was made by a Gentleman, who appeared to view the matter with great moderation, to amend the first resolution in as much as the Memorial should be returned to the committee for reconsideration and modification. The amendment however had no supportors with the exception of its originator, and the Gentleman who seconded the motion. The community have thus distinctly declared their approbation of the whole procedure of the committee, whose labour, from the hurried manner in which the memorial was got up, and the great distance between their places of abode, was considerable.

We notice with satisfaction that, the resolution as moved by Mr. Fletcher, contains a modification of some unfortunate words which possibly in the hurry of getting the document up were unnoticed; or to the majority of the committed, feeling intensely the degradeing position in which this Ordinance would have placed them, they may not then have appeared to strong, though now, under different circumstances they may be of a different opinion. There is no doubt that, many of those who signed the memorial, did not approve of particular expressions, and through they perfectly concurred in the main points, on some of less importance they might demur, but without cavilling at the interpretation which could be placed upon certain words, and being strongly impressed with the necessity of steps being immediately taken for the abrogation of this most un-English law they readily signed the memorial. The most objectionable word in the whole document is iniquitous, yet the true difinition of the word is simply contrary to equity. Whether the ticketting and labelling of British subjects, be an equitable procedure on the part of a British colonial Government, we leave it for others to say, but in our humble opinion it was at all events a most unjust one. Regretting, as we certainly do, the admission of one or two words into a memorial, which circumstances rendered so necessary, we think that when His Excellency and his advisers call to remembrance that they, sitting calmly and deliberately in Council, passed a registration act without excluding even the Military, and were it to be enforced, from the esteemed Commander of the forces, to the Sentry at his gate, every man of them would be liable to the penalty of twenty dollars, if found without a registration ticket—we say when they remember the clause which they have omitted they may forget a few words, which were inserted in a document hurriedly got up, but not uncalled

We return to the meeting which was conducted with much propriety and moderation. With the exception of a speech by a young gentleman—probably his maiden effort there was none of that violent vituperation which but too often characterizes similar assemblies. The predominating feeling appeared to be that, as Government had in the meantime set the Ordinance aside, and declared in a public Notification the possibility of its being cancelled entirely, they (the meeting) had met partly for the purpose of congratulating each other upon their escape from a system of petty tyranny, which they were certain was not contemplated by the Executive when the Ordinance was passed.

It was further moved, and unanimously carried that five Gentlemen should form a standing committee, with power to add to their numbers; that these Gentlemen should aid Government by advice or information upon matters having a direct or indirect influence upon the commerce of this colony. It was most clearly and distinctly stated by the mover and seconder of this resolution, also by other Gentlemen of the meeting, that it was not intended that this committee should oppose the local Authorities-on the contrary that, they should co-operate with them, and in as much as there was not one member of the Legislative Coun. cil acquainted with commerce, it was believed that the benefits derived from this committee: would be duly appreciated. We would respectfully suggest to this committee, whether the formation of a chamber of commerce, would not only better answer the present purpose, but that it would also in other respects be highly beneficial, in promoting the commercial prosperity of Hongkong.

Another matter which was brought forward at the meeting cannot be too well known, or too widely circulated. It having come to the knowledge of a Gentleman present that, His Excellency and Council were impressed with a belief, that, in the recent emeute among the Chinese inhabitants, they were instigated to their passive exhibition of resistance by Europeans: this Gentleman and others there present declared in the most emphatic manner that such was not the case. There was no co-operation-no advice-nor any aid afforded them. The closing of shops and the strike among the workmen was only a mode of resistance characteristic of the Chinese and it is a singular fact connected with this affair that, though every native shop in the place was shut up, and every coolie had ceased to work, there was no rioting, no plundering, nor any noisy demonstration of opposition to the Authorities.

The true cause for the Chinese having come to the determination of leaving the colony is now no secret. The proclamation which was stuck up on the 29th of October declaring that this tax would be levied on the 1st of November was the first intimation they received of the poll tax, and from the ambiguity of the language the impression conveyed was, that the tax was monthly not annual. This was the true cause of the Chinese preparing to leave the colony. A blunder on the part of the person who drew up the proclamation excited the whole commotion. The Celestials are a passive race and will bear squeezing to any ordi. nary extent, but when this blundering translator would squeeze one half of their monthly wages out of them, then they thought it was

Had His Excellency been aware of the circumstance which we have now stated, and had he further been aware of the moderation of sentiment displayed at the meeting, and the earnest desire evinced by some of the leading men in this colony not to thwart nor oppose the Executive, but to aid them by every means in their power, then we think His Excellency would have suppressed the uncalled for taunt contained in his Notification of Saturday and published in a Gazette Extraordinary of Monday. We unhesitatingly express our opinion that the assertion which has been put forth of the comperation of British with the Chinese inhabit Ats of this colony is utterly without foundation, and we fear has originated with some evil disposed person, who would rather see His Excellency and the British community at variance, than see them in that perfect harmony which is not only necessary for the welfare of the colony, but also for their own personal comfort, and to disturb which we look upon as a grave offence.

His Excellency does not judge correctly of the feelings of this community, if he supposes they wish captiously to oppose his government. On the contrary, had he opportunities of hearing the opinions of private individuals, he would ascertain, that many of his measures are highly approved of; and if in the present instance an arbitrary Ordinance, only suited for the most despotic state, has been resisted by a memorial couched in language stronger than is permitted in such documents, an apology for the language may be found in the enactments of the Ordinance which it reprobates. We can assure His Excellency that what the Merchants of this colony require, is permission to follow their important pursuits, under the friendly protection of the laws of their native country; but if any attempt is made at coercion, they will sacrifice the money they were induced to invest in property and return to Macao, where under a foreign flag they will not be subjected to laws repugnant to their feelings, and utterly opposed to those cherished privileges of perronal freedom which is their inalicnable birthsight. We fear that at the council board, His Excellency leans more towards the opinion of those who have been brought up in the camp, and whose ideas of a government are drawn from military law, than to the milder, but more correct opinions of men who are well acquainted with the civil laws of our country, and who doubtless know that the Ordinance in question will be repudiated by every member of Her Majesty's Government.

But to proceed. The circumstances of this Colony are in every respect unparalleled. Ferments, which in other settlements might go off as harmlessly as a Chinese cracker, are not to be indulged with impunity here, -especially when the objects in dispute embrace the interests of the Chinese population equally with those of the European. It must not be supposed that we would, for this reason, condemn all remonstrance, and advise an unconditional surrender of ourselves to Government, thereby custing, as it were, our opinions into whatever -mould authority may prescribe. Far from it;freedom of thought is the entailed birth-right of every uncovenanted Englishman, but this we do maintain, that such freedom should be exercised discreetly, with moderation, consistency, and due respect towards the constituted authorities.

Now the Proceedings under review appear to

us defective in these essential particulars. In the present stage of the Colony every friend to order should have discountenanced and suppressed Chinese interference. It was therefore highly indiscreet to allow the Compredores to become partisans in a matter involving collision of opinion with the Government. The British Community might have assembled with that dignified composure. which would have so well become individuals who aspire to the Council Chamber. They might have carefully dissected the obnoxious Ordinance, pointed out its supposed deformities, in calm, clear, but guarded terms, and earnestly solicited the patient attention of Government to their respectfully couched remarks.

In consequence of the above letter from Mr. Shelley, and to remove any impression that may be caused thereby, that the Committee appointed on the 28th Ultimo, with reference to the Registration Ordinance allowed any unneceseary delay to take place in their correspondence with the Government, the Members forming the late Committee have requested us to state for the information of the Memorialist and others interested the following facts.

The Deputation was received and the first Memorial delivered about 4 P. M. the 30th Ulto. The second Memorial was despatched at half past one P. M. the 31st Ulto.

Mr. Shelley's letter dated the 30th Ulto., returning the first Memorial was received by the Committee at 3 P. M. the 31st Ulto.

The Committee's reply to Mr. Shelley's letter of the 30th Ulto. was on the point of being despatched at seven P. M. the 31st Ulto when Mr. Shelley's letter dated 21st Ulto., in reply to the second Momorial was received.

reply to the Committee's letter of the 31st Ulto. was received at 8 p. m. the 2nd instant, after the Public Meeting had taken place.

One of the Committee resides at the Extreme East of Victoria, and one nearly at the Extreme West, a distance of near three miles a part.

After the Public Meeting Mr. Kay the Secretary forwarded a copy of the Resolutions to Government, which were returned on Sunday morning the 3rd instant, with the following letter :-

No. 1 Albany, 3rd November, 1844. Sir,-I beg to acknowledge the receipt of the Copy of Resolutions which you resterday sent me for the consideration of His Excellency the Governor and Members of Council.

His Excellency the Governor and the Members of Council having already declared their intention to refuse all Memorials not properly and respectfully worded and it being my duty to carry out such intention, I return you these Resolutions and regret that I cannot comply with your request that I should lay them before the Council.
