

MACAQ.

We hear that some important changes will imme. diately take place in the regulations under which trade is conducted at this port. On the 1st of January, Macao will be declared a free port, open to the flag of all nations upon a perfect equality, Foreign shipping will be admitted to the inner harbour, hitherto only open to Chinese, Portuguese and Spanish vessels. The jurisdiction of the Macao Government will extend to the Typa, and it is said that merchants will be permitted; to Warehouse their goods in Macao, paying a duty of one per cent, if re-exported within one

We fear that these concessions are made too late for the purpose intended, even were they not incumbered by a very serious new impost, namely, ships anchoring in the Typa or in the harhour, will be required to pay tonnage dues of fire

in all the commercial regulations of Spanish or that nothing could surpass the cordiality and Portuguese governments. They cannot see that friendship which has throughout subsisted beliberality is their true policy; their views extend no further than the small revenue that can be raised directly from commerce, but to the infinitely greater indirect revenue they are blind. Macao from reasons which we have more than once pointed out, still retains a large portion of what is termed the outside trade of China. The Chin-chew and the Canton trading Junks give it a very decided preference over Hongkong; why such should be the case we need not now discuss. but there is no denying the fact. The large American houses also give their support to Macno-it is at that port that nearly all their vessels first arrive and from thence they take their final departure. Could the Authorities of Macao only see their present position with the eys of a person perfectly uninterested and unbiased, they would lay no tonnage dues upon shipping, they would levy no duties at the custom house, nor would they put one cent upon goods stored for re-export. As an entrepot Macao possesses advantages which even the perversity and cupidity of it rulers, have not utterly destroyed. A perfect freedom from all restrictions would yet draw a portion of the foreign merchants, including all the Americans to that port, Proprietors of house, property would again be enabled to rent their houses on favorable terms—the people would obtain employment as heretofore from foreigners, and by an influx of strangers, money would again be put in circulation and prosperity be restored to the city of St. John. We fear the suicidal act of imposing tonnage dues upon foreign vessels will consummate the ruin of Macao. The Americans will withdraw entirely and concentrate their commerce in Canton, and great as is the present distress of the people it will become still greater. The senate clings to its old fashioned ideas, they place dues apon the ships of the people who are their best friends. They will discover when it is too late that the foreign trade of China can be conducted perfectly well were Macao a heap of ruins, and they will regret, when regret is unavailing their own infatuation. Since the day that Hongkong was ceded to Great Britain until now, we never doubted that the British merchants, with the affection of loval subjects, would place themselves under the protection of the laws of their own country, and that their support would consequently in a great degree be withdrawn from the neighbouring settlement. They have done so, and though unfortunately for themselves commerce has not followed, the causes are known, and beyond their control, but when these causes are removed, Hongkong will take her destined position among the great marts of the East. Rivalry between the two places is out of the question; but at the same time the flourishing condition of the one need not cause the ruln of the other. Macao under judicious management might even now be saved from her impending fate. Let the senate only enquire into the causes of the extraordinary prosperity of the barren Island of St. Thomas, in the West Indies, let them come nearer home and view the trade and revenue of Singapore, a place but of yesterday, and they have abundant proofs that a colony which has no export within itself, and which has not a population to consume any amount of imports, must offer some advantage to the foreign merchant, ere he seek that particular port as a mart for the exchange of commodities. The inducements of a port free of charges, duties, or exactions of any kind, has established St. Thomas and Singapore; these advantages will yet establish Hongkong; and

they would also have been the salvation of Macao. Many are the causes which have operated against Hongkong, but fortunately they are all removeable. Nominally a free port, and actually so in as much as we levy no dues upon shipping or duties upon goods, still point of fact to the trading community of China the port is closed, or only open by permission of the Chinese Mandarins. Macao suffers from the capidity of its rulers-Hongkong from the extraordinary infatuation of the man who laid every possible restriction upon local commerce. These restrictions must not be lost sight of until they are removed—the continuous falling of the water drop wille at into the surface of the hardest rock; it may be that, by its earnest resteration, our weak voice may have some influence in the removal of the shackles which are now placed upon the commercial prosperity of the

We would recall to the recollection of our readers a circumstance which occurred shortly before the arrival of our present Governor. A deputation from the merchants of Chin chew came to Hongkong, to enquire upon what terms they and their countrymen could obtain land upon which they might erect Hongs and settle among us. To our local readers we need not say that, these men are the most enterprising of the inhabitants of China, and that their residence would to a certainty be the means of supporting, or forming a considerable local trade. It is now upwards of six months since the strangers were here, but not a Hong has been built, nor has one of them returned to the Island. Need we enquire why? On this, as on every other occasion the commerce of the colony was neglected through some ridiculous prejudice, or foolish idea of the value of land. The settlement of these men, we hesitate not to affirm, would have doubled the value of property-would ultimately have doubled the colonial revenue—but they were treated coldly and left under the impression that they could not purchase land on fair and liberal terms. We have heard it stated that, one Gentleman connected with Government, objected to the Chin-chew merchants, because he feared they would require too much of this valuable island upon which to build their Hongs-this sapient Gentleman dreaded the arrival of from fifty to a hundred of them, they would require too much water frontage forsooth; but the greatest benefit that could be conferred on the colony would be to cover the water frontage from East point to West point, with the Hongs of respectable Chinese Merchants.

In our last paper we afinounced the arrival of Monsieur Lagrene the French Minister Plenipotentiary with his Lady and suite

We have taken some pains to collect authentic information as to the reception of our distinguished visitors, and we shall now briefly present our renders with the result of those inquiries.

On Thursday evening Monsieur and Madame Lagrane and a portion of the cuite dined with His Excellency the Governor, in whose residence they were provided with apartments during their stay on the Island.

On Friday our hospitable and much esteemed Lieut Governor, Major General D'Aguilar, gave a splendid entertainment.

The distinguished guest and his Lady were received at the General's door by a guard of honor. consisting of the Grenndier. Company of the 98 h Regiment accompanied by the band. The effect of this military display was considerably heighten ed by a range of torch bearers, who were drawn up in front of the house. At one end of the dining room were placed the French and English flags. their folds commingling in token of sincere and joyous brotherhond. Dinner concluded, the Major General rose, and after a short and compli mentary preface, adapted to the occasion, gave the

HEALTH OF His Majesty the King of the French, and may He live long to promote the prosperity of France and to preserve the peace of Europe.

The Tonst was received by the foreign guest with extraordinary emotion.

The Health of the Queen of England was then given by the French Ambassador, prefaced by Speech from that Gentleman, full of expessions of the highest respect and esteem for the English nation, and of his own personal and deep gratitude for the distinguished and kind manner of his re-

The Health of Mr. Davis having been proposed by Monsieur Lagrene, the Governor replied to it in French with great fluency and success.

The next toast was, Madamo and Monsieur Lagrene, with hest acknowledgements for the honor conferred upon

The following day the minister and his lady paid a visit to H. M. Ship Castor, where a dejeune was prepared in Captain Graham's usual style of profuse hospitality. We are told that the frank and generous bearing of this thorough Seaman and genuine British officer, quite won the hearts of His Stranger guests, and that Capt. Graham's liberality, kindness, and good humour have since formed the theme of their discourse on shore.

The same evening Mousieur and Madame Lagrene dined with the Attorney General, by priority of engagement, whilst Admiral Cecille and a portion of the suite were entertained by the Honble Major Caine.

On Monday the Ambassador and his lady proceeded to visit Chuck-Choo in the Steamer Proserpine, and in the evening dined on board the Cleopatra with Rear Admiral Cecille, who entertained on this occasion the Governor, Lieut.-Governor, and a party of other Guests from the shore.

Yesterday morning the visitors took their departure, with all the honors our limited garrison could afford. A guard of honor consisting of the Grenndier Company 98th Regiment, with the band, received the guests on their leaving Mr. Davis house, and escorted them to the Commissariat yard, where a lane was formed by portions of the 98th Regiment and 4th Madras native Infantry.

The Ambassador appeared to feel extremely these demonstrations of attention, and before leaving the wharf stepped forward and took leave of the Commanding Officers of Corps, Staff Officers, and others assembled on the occasion.

The American Brig. Hannah, from Manila with a cargo of rice, was boarded by pirates near the

The piratical vessel is described as having all the appearance of a Mandarin boat, and was full of men. Previous tween the French minister and the authorities of to carrying the Hannah they kept up a fire from several Guns, one of some size, and as is usual, when close alongside fire balls were thrown upon deck. The pirates were much disappointed at finding their prize loaded with rice, as there is reason to believe they mistook her for a vessel having 150 chests of opium on board, in company of which she left Macao. They helped themselves to a Chronometer with a few trifling articles, and after anchoring the Brig, stood boldly up the river. We regret to hear that fears are entertained for the safety of seven of the Hannah's .crew. Some of them it is supposed escaped in a boat but one or two were probably killed. The Captain and second mate secreted themselves on board, and tho pilot found a refuge in the top, from whence he could see what was going on. Upon hearing of the affair Commodore Parker promptly despatched one of his Lieutenants with a party, of Marines to the Bogue to demand an explanation.

This is the second case of piracy which has been committed with forty miles of Hongkong in a few weeks, and in both instances lives have been lost Opium or treasure is the prey, which is chiefly sought, and there is no doubt that the pirates have confederates in Macao who inform them when vessels with valuables on board are about to sail.

This is really a very alarming state of affairsand the danger will in all probability increase, unless steps are taken at once to capture these desperadoes. "What is every body's business is nobody's," and this may be the feeling of those who ought to exert themselves at present. Ships of war are too large for the service of watching the haunts of, and rooting out, the desperate characters who are placing unnamed vessels in such jecpardy. We would suggest that a few Gun-boats, or a small Steamer, be constantly employed cruising among the neighbouring islands and as far up the Canton river as the Bogue forts, always ready to pounce upon the pirates when firing is heard. But the question is, who pays the expence? We fear, that in the meantime, trading vessels will have to protect themselves, and we would advise them to have a bright look out and keep their powder day.

The Brig was wretchedly armed, and though some attempt was made at a defence, it was perfectly hopeless.

Hydrographical remarks and positions by Captain Belcher, H. M. Surveyingship Samarang.

Cape Rivers point is rocky with a long sandy Bay, fronted by a coral ledge at low water extending to its northern angle, both these points fork from Rivers Peak, northerly a low rocky Island connected by/a coral flat with the Main between which and Cape or point Rivers the coast recedes considerably. The Islets off this Cape are connected by a coral ledge nearly-dry at low water-within this and the Cape is a channel with from 18 to 20 fms., the coast running back into deep. retired Bays with two large villages. The two Islets off this Cape are very remarkable one being tufted with trees and perpendicular to seaward, the other about half its height, and white with the slime of sea birds, the latter I have named Slime Island; for positions see the following table.

Borneo.—A rock nearly awash lies N. 11 E. 31 miles from Tanjong Sepang. The. rock marked awash or covered at high water, to the southward of the Island of St. Picire 2 miles, is always above water, and vissels. should not at night pass nearer then 4 miles. to those Islands without seeing that rock before dark, the passage between it and the Island is safe, no passage between the Islands.

The reefs off Tanjong Apee extend about 3 miles, and vessels passing would do well to keep a respectable distance. Merely making out the sandy beach from the deck. Vessels wishing to water may anchor in a very convenient berth in 6 or 8 fms., about north of the Cape which is low land capped by a small Hummock a mile inland. The best landing is just to the southward of the northern reef or between them in the first Bay where two ponds (continually filtering) will be found; that to the southward is very pure and clear water, filtered from the other, which is much stained with leaves and decayed vegetable matter. The Samarang watered by hoses—trees adapted for spars or plank will be found a short distance in land.

A Shoal is reported between the Acasta Rock and Victory Island.

FROM THE PERING GAZETTE.

Keshen-After the memorial adverted to in a former number, a far more diffuse statement of his financial difficulties in his new Government has been forwarded to the throne. We must remark that the Chinese forces, which maintain the ascendancy of the Great Emperor, in Tibet only consist of two Regiments. By dint of policy and management, such a small number suffices to keep the country in total subjection, because the Mongul tribes and the natives them selves are obliged to keep up a considerable army and militia, which answers, all the purposes of protection and police. The Chinese Mantchoo establishment therefore costs a mere trifle, but the Emperor has notwithstanding to send every year by the annual Caravan about _50,000 -100,000 taels, which the Chinese enerchants that proceed to that Country must reimburse by the sale of their teas and other articles, lest any bullion might go out of the country. During the war with England however, those supplies failed, and the military officers instead of waiting for a change of circumstances, helped themselves very freely from the public treasury, and not only emptied it, but incurred moreover a considerable debt. Keshen on examining the accounts, has discovered a very great deficit, and accused high and low as being guilty of wontonly expending the public money. In these times of difficulty, no memorial could have come so opportune, and redound so much to the honor of the parsimonious state men, whilst it will give at the same time a handle to fleece these unfortunate officials, who no doubt are anxious to escape heavy punishment by paying suitable fines. As for Keshen himself-a disinterested statesman, who possessed before his degradation property to an immense amount, and was subsequently made a begger, in the literal sense of the word, by Imperial Clemency—he will hold no sinecure in Tibet, and appropriate to himself all the gold bars within his reach. No man possesses such high financial talent especially when exerted in his own behalf, and he will no doubt again make up his losses.

Much distilling of a kind of liquor resembling gin, has latterly been carried on in the Capital without any duty being paid for the permission. On the discovery of this illicit trade, a party of soldiers was sent off to apprehend these transgressors of the revenue regulations, but instead of seizing them, each received a heavy bribe and let them escape. Trifling as this circumstance was, it came to the ears of the Emperor, who ordered a commission to sit on the culprits, and they were sentenced to receive a number of blows, according to the amount of the money they pocketed. However to profit even from so palty an affair, the Court changed the blows into fines, and thus made these warriors double their illicit gains, in order

to escape the aci of the law.

When the English entered the Yangtsze, the Vice-Admiral commanding at the entrance, lost not only his rank, but his posterity to the last degree was declared unfit to hold in future any situation under the Crown. Keving however has interceded for this unfortunate wight, represented the injustice of the sentence, and begged that his Rouble, Proctor. Son might again he admitted into favour. Dear Sire—We have been called upon by Babon Muttyloll Seal to give up the price we obtained for your copper per "Enterprise," and we immediatly replied, that we did not feel ourselves at liberty to do so. We naturally referred to the sale in question, and are very sorry to find that it has been erroneously rendered at Sicca rupees 34, 06, instead of Sicca rupees 33 0 6, at which latter price it was sold.

On reference to our letter of 7th June, 1843, wherein we state that tile copper had fallen materially from Sicra rupees 34 2 0, you will see at once that we could hardly have obtained Sicca rupees 34 0 6 in July; and though Sicca rupees 34 0 6 is mentioned in our advices though Sices rupees 34 0 6 is mentioned in our advices of the 6th of that month, it is simply copied from the account-sales erroneously made out. It out own price current of July you will find tile-copper quoted at Sices rupees 33 4 0. We now enclose a corrected account sales, and trust you will credit us with the difference. The amount is trifling, but we fear it may lead to some unpleasantness; and we have to request that you will permit us to refer to our correspondence with you to show in Calcuma how palpable the mistake is. We are now just closing our books for the commercial year, and our "sales account" shows a discrepancy which would point to this mistake.—We remain your faithful servants. faithful servants. Letter from Potter & Co. to John Leech, Esq. Stalybridge, dated Calcula, 14th May, 1844.

Dear Sir, We have been called upon by Baboo Muttyloli Seal to give up the prices we got for your grey shirtings, per "Gentoo" and "Meg of Meldon?" The "Gentoo's" shipment was the second you made to us Your first shipment, P. 478 to 497, per "Bland," we sold at Co's rupees 5 14; and we mentioned that we could have got a little more if you had marked the bales with your usual mark. Our banyans or stock brokers might have sold the "Gentoo's" to arrive at rupées 5 15, which we were anxious to do, seeing a probability of a falling market. They secured to us this price, but missed the opportunity of sale. The goods, after this delay, were actually sold at rupees 5.13; and at foot of the agreement is written 2 annas allowance from our banyans, making 5 15, at which price we rendered acness. The "Meg of Meldon's" shipment was sold in the ordinary ways at rupees 5-12. as rendered. In some instances, our banyans have taken small portions of your shipmonts to their own account, to enable us to render account sales and thus have lost or gained a our books will show.

As to Baboo Muttyloll Seal's request, we immediately answered that we did not feel ourselves at liberty to comply with it, nor should we do so without your authority. He is reported to be a man of property, and has hitherto been banyan for many houses in Calcutta; but we know that several have lately discharged him. It is hardly likely that he would be willing to make the little concessions which our banyans occasionally do, who are promoted entirely through their own merits. and are banyans for us only.

It perhaps would have been as well if we had mentioned the circumstances under which the "Gentoo's" shipment was sold; but our mentioning the market price at the time clearly shows, that we had no intention of injuring our heighbours. Our main desire has been to do our best for you. We have so little in common with the natives around us, that we cannot do without a banyan or native broker, who is security to us for the dealers in the bazaara; and it is the custom for the native buyers to allow the banyan 2 per cent, broke tage or "Dustoorie," and which brokerage was given up by our banyans to make up the difference in price arising from their delay in selling your shipment per "Gentoe,"—We are your frithfully, Porrea & Co.

Letter from Potter & Co. to Potter, Brothers, Manchester, dated Calcutte, 10th June, 1844

Dear Sirs. - With reference to the circular issued by Baboo Mattyloll Seal, which we forwarded to you pet "Hindostan" steamer, we thought it right to issue the following amongst the English houses in Calcutta: -

"Gentlemen,—We decline taking any notice whatever to Baboo Muttyloll Seal or the circular he has thought proper to issue. We shall avail ourselves of the earliest opportunity of obtaining permission from the parties concerned, to enter into a full explanation, with [if we are allowed] we shall be ready to give to any English merchant or agent of respectability, who may be interested in this matter. - We are, gentlemen, your most obedi-" Potter & Co."

As we have occrsionally rendered account sales which, under peculiar circumstances, have slightly differed from the prices actually obtained, we cannot literally deny the charge brought against us by Baboo Muttyloli Seal; but we declare we have done nothing calculated to injure our neighbours or to eefrand any one.

In one of our letters to our constituents, of 19th January, 1844, we wrote to the effect, "that to move off different kinds of goods we were obliged to make averages." Mr. John Leech, too, is acquainted with the peculiar circumstances under

which his second sale was made. In order to render account sales of any particular invoice, we have sometimes taken a few odd cases or bales to our own account, at the full market price of the day, running a risk or rise or full, by which we have sometimes made a trifle, or lost a trifle. And once or twice we have been obliged to decuct, from an absolute sale price, small losses we have sustained by non-fulfilment of contract for former shpiments, allowances for out pieces slight damages, &c All these discrepancies, since we

commenced business, are as follow: --Total Debit - - Rupees 710 8 7 Credit - - ,, 639 0 7

Balance, a loss of - Rupees 7J 8 0 On a business of two years, of which full detail is given at foot. A portion of the above losses have been made up to us by our banyan.

We have sometimes, in order to move off goods. been obliged to accept an offer from one dealtor for a lot of goods partly beloning to one constituent and partly to another, at rates below the market value for one, and above for another, the dealer refusing to take the one without the other: when this has been the case, we have thought it right to give the fair market price to each. If we cannot have these facilitations, it would be difficult, in a large business like ours, to obtain full average prices for each lot of goods that comes to our consingment; and we fully believe that most, if not all, of our neighbours doing a similar business to ourselves act in a similar manner.

We cannot tell how Baboo Muttyloll Scal has obtained his information of our affairs thes des that he may have obtained from England), unless he has done so through secretly bribing one of our native clerks: a deed that none but a secoundrel would banyans, making 5 15, at which price we rendered account sales to arrive, mentioning in our letter that the price had fallen to rupees 5 13, to avoid any unpleasant-ness. The "Mer of Meldon's" shipment was said in publicity to the whole matter, is chiefly indebted. And we firmly, believe, that the whole charge is brought against us by Baboo Muttyloll Seal, out of spite, because we and our young Baboos have trifle, say 6 pies or 1d, per piece, one way or other, as beaten him in sales. We have frequently made inquirles from the native dealers, as to the rate of dustoorie, or brokerage, they pay to the different banyans on the sale of manufactures; and, whilst most of the banyans get the usual allowance from the purchasers of two per cent, some occasionally. exact three per cent, which of coursed tells against their sales.

We have treated the whole matter hitherto with comtempt; but, if it be possible there should be any amongst our supportors who think differently, and should they desire an explanation, let them appoint any respectable parties to examine our books, when we will lay them open to such inspection, and explain each particular case.-We are yours very truly, POTTER & Co.

The bleached calicoes intended for despatch to China are of various qualities, or sorts, and prices. The price for those of 371 arshines in length, I broad, and weighing 6 to 7 lbs., is from 18 to 20 rubles assignation per piece at Mascow. Breadth 12 arshine, weighing 8 to 9 lbs., the price 22 to 24 ruoles. Breadth 14 arshine, weighing 9 to 10 lbs, price 24 to 26 rubles assignation. Lighter calicoes are also despatching. weighing 5 to 5½ lbs., costing at Moscow 15 to 18 rubles assignation per piece. These different calicoes are made from varn No. 36 English for warp, and Nos. 42 to 44 for weft. Or with Nos. 32 to 34 warp, and 48 to 40 weft. The first sort are folded like Dutch or Belgian linen cloths. The others made up flat.

The furs which find their way from Russian to China are chiefly young white sheepskins, for, black cat, lynx cat, lambs, called grey and back Astrakan, seal skins, &c.; the latter in largest quantity. The Russians expedite also to China divers articles of cutlery, common fire-arms, corals in small grains, mirror glass, and watches.

Such is the shape in which the trading transactions of Russia with China are carried on yearly as Kiakhta, at the two great commercial gatheringt in February and March. From Kiakhta the Russian merchandise is transported to the great affair of Kalgan in China. by the Chinese merchants.

Since 1839 an average of 125,000 or 130.000 chests of tea have been annually exchanged against Russian wares to the value of twenty-eight or thirty millions rubles assignation. The price per quality of tea does not vary with the Chinese; but the Russian merchants give a larger or smaller quantity of merchandise, according to the greater or less demand for ten in Russia, or the more or less abundance of the tea-crop in China.

Before 1839 the quantity of tea exchanged at Kiakhta, against Russian merchandise scarcely exceeded 50,000 chests, As before said, it has how reached to 130,000 chests.

The value of the wares to be exchanged against it is fixed at Kiakhta. A commission of six members, chosen among the Russian merchants, and presided over by the Custom-house director, treats for Russian merchandise Another commission, of an equal number of members, taken among the Chinese, and presided over by their governor, treats for Chinese merchandise. These two commissions discuss the prices, which, once determined, become law for the merchants of the two nations.

From Moscow to Kiakhta the cost of carriage amounts to twenty-five rubles assignation the pond (40lbs, English about) From Nijai Novgored to Kiakhta the cost is fourteen to sixteen rubles assignation per pood.

There is an error here, the assortment amounts to 109 pieces —Blue must be 40 not 49 picles —Eprion F, or C.

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
