A land sale was held on the 1st. Of 17 building lots offered, nine were bought in; the the eight sold, were small lots of hitle value; except to parties whose property they adjoined, and will not add more than £50 per annum to the land revenue. Eight farming lots in the Soo-kun-poo valley and at Koong-koong-loo (in extent from 2½ to 7 acres each)were also put up for competition at an annual rent of £1 per acre. Five of the lots were purchased by Europeans at a trifle above the upset price. The ight lots amount to 31 acres, and yield a gross rental of £37.

The justice as well as the policy of taking cultivated land from the present occupants may be doubted.
