The period of the greatest violence of this Typhoon appears to have been about 6 hours, from 8 A. 2t to 2 p. M. The greatest depression of the berometer being 28.69 at half past 10 A. 2t, from which point the mercury rose gradually, although the Typhoon continued to rage for several hours after a fact which has been previously observed, and is noticed by Colonel Reid.

The barometer had sviderally fallen before 8 A. 2t. when it is first quoted above at 29 25. Assuming it to have stood at its average height, the maximum depression probably did not exceed 8 of an Inch. The most remarkable circumstance however attending this Typhoon, is the will attend fact (see log) of the gyrations of the whirlwind being, for several hours, direct (i.e. moving in the same direction as the bands of a watch) instead of retrograde according to all previous observation.

The observations however being made from one point only, and that being stationary, sufficient data does not exist and no general inferences can be drawn on this subject, or of the extent and direction of this Typhoon,

No. 4] — I have the honor to enclose two reports, from Major Gibson, 7th Drugoon Guards, who was left in charge of the camp of the 16th inst, during-our operations.

Cape Mounted Rifles, and the gun, to defend the drift, I despatched Major Campbell with 135 men of the 91st Regt to the assistence of Major Gibson, but I regret to say before Major Campbell had joined, the enemy were in possession of the wagon sore, which rendered the removal of the wagons inpracticable, although the timely reinforcement enabled Major Gibson to secure and bring off his ammunition wagons.

The loss on our side has been one officer. Lieut Cochrane, 91st Regiment, severely wounded, and two men, 91st Regiment, killed, and three men 7th Dragoon Gurads, severely wounded. I regret also to report that four men ort of the six of the Cape Mounted Rifles who brought the dispatches to me this morning were shot by the enemy this morning. I trust I lis Excellency will feel satisfied with the movements of the troops this morning, which were most gratifying to witness. I am greatly indebted to Lieut-Colonnel Richardson for his shbe assistance and support in every way, and to Major Armstrong in command of the Cape Mounted Rifles, Major Cam, bell, commanding 91st Regiment, Captain Brown, commanding Reyal Artillery, and all the officers and troops on this occasion.
