We have received the following communi-cation from Capt. Jauncey relative to the loss of the Schooner Warlock.

The Warlock left Hongkong on the morning of the 7th of September in communications. of the Nethodner Warkock.

The Warkock left Hongkong on the morning of the 7th of September in company with the Poppy, with the wind at N.E. and dirty squally weather, at 6, 30 r. m. we anchored in Mirs Bay, at daylight of the 8th we got under weigh, and on the night of the 10th anchored in Namea. On the 11th we again proceeded on our royage with light South Eastedy breezes, and squally. On the morning of the 14th inst, off Chimoo the wind veered to the Northward, with fine clear weather. At sunset the wird increasing rapidly, sent drawn top G. yards and reduced sail as requisite.

At daylight on the 15th we fetched Pyramid point, the gale still increasing, with a tremendous sea running, 11thought it advisable to bear and, and accordingly run for the anchorage of Chino-Chew, at 7, 30 s. M. came to an anchor, with two anchors in five fathoms between the Islands of Tat-toj and the Main, an anchorage always considered by the oldest Coasters, one of the best places of refuge.
