Extract of Despatch No. 84, dated 12th November 1853, from The Right Honorable The Earl of Clarendon K. G. to the address of His Excellency Sir George Bonham, Bart. K. C. B. BY His Excellency Sir Samuel George Bonham, Baronet, Knight Commander of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, Governor and Commander-in-Chief of the Colony of Hongkong and its Dependencies, and Vice-Admiral of the same, Her Majesty's Plenipotentiary, and Chief Superintendent of the Trade of British Subjects in China, with the Advice of the Legislative Council of Hongkong.

AN ORDINANCE FOR THE PREVENTION OF DESERTION AMONGST HER MAJESTY'S NAVAL AND MILITARY FORCES, SERVING IN THE COLONY OF HONGKONG OR IN CHINA.

Title.

[19th January, 1854.]

Preamble.

WHEREAS Deserters from Her Majesty's Forces aforesaid have heretofore concealed themselves in and on board Vessels frequenting the Ports, Havens, and Roadsteads of the Coast of China; and it is deemed expedient to provide a Remedy in such cases:

Superintendent Be it therefore enacted and ordained by His Excellency The Governor and Chief of Trade or Con-Superintendent of the Trade of Her Majesty's Subjects in China, with the Advice sul, on information of the Legislative Council of Hongkong, That, after the passing of this Ordinance, laid before him, it shall be lawful for Her Majesty's Chief Superintendent of Trade, or in his for the apprehen-absence for the Officer Administering the Government of the said Colony, or for any sion of Naval and of Her Majesty's Consuls in China, on satisfactory Information being afforded to Military Deserters, him or them that any Soldier, Sailor, or Marine, has deserted from such Forces and concealed himself in any British Ship or Vessel being within One Hundred and concealed himself in any British Ship or Vessel being within One Hundred Miles of the Coast of China, or within any Ship or Vessel on the High Seas aforesaid within the same Limits, and not being lawfully entitled to claim the Protection of the Flag of any State or Nation, in pursuance of such Information to issue his or their Warrant for the Search after and Apprehension of any such Deserter; and that, on the said Superintendent or Officer so Administering the Government as hended, on proof of aforesaid or Consul being satisfied on due Investigation that any Person so apprehension to be headed is a Deserter as aforesaid the said Superintendent or Officer as aforesaid or
