Sig.—I have the honour to bring to your knowledge for the information of His Excellency the Governor, that, perceiving from Colonial Surgeon's Report for 1858, published in Government Gazette of the 19th ultimo, that the Statistical Returns referring to Signal Mortality in the Police Force of the Colony did not clearly exhibit the actual amount of Sickness as compared with Strength of Figure 1 wrote to the Acting Colonial Surgeon on the subject, enclosing a Return compiled from the daily state of Sick. The substance of note was, that although his Statistics were fully comprehended by him and myself, that they were likely to lead to erroneous conclusions, the casual observer; and that as the actual amount of Sickness had been so remarkably small when the calibre of the Force and its duties at considered, and more especially when placed in juxta-position with the amount of Sickness in the Military Forces in the Colony, that I sidered it very desirable that the Return should be clear and explicit. With this view I enclosed the Return before alluded to, and beginned in the state of the Return before alluded to the Report before specified.
