SHIRIYASAKI LIGHTHOUSE,

Change of Character of Fog Signal.

Notice is hereby given that the FOG SIREN at Shiriyasaki Lighthouse, East entrance to Tsugaru Straits, will hereafter be sounded at intervals of 30 seconds, giving a blast of 4 seconds' duration.

If the Siren be disabled, a Hand Siren will be sounded at intervals of one minute, with 5 minutes' repose after every 10 minutes' working.
