BILL

ENTITLED

An Ordinance to amend The Births and Deaths Registration Ordinance, 1896.

BE it enacted by the Governor of Hongkong, with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council thereof, as follows:-

- 1. This Ordinance may be cited as The Births and Short title. Deaths Registration Ordinance, 1901, and shall be read and construed as one Ordinance with Ordinances 16 of 1896 and 20 of 1898.
- 2. Section 12 of Ordinance 16 of 1896 is hereby amended Amendment by adding the following sub-section at the end thereof, of section 12 of Ordinance 16 of 1896. namely:

"(f.) In any case where the Medical Officer of Health Power to hold is not satisfied that the cause of the death of any person has been satisfactorily determined, it shall be lawful for the Medical Officer of Health to order the removal of any dead body to some suitable place set apart for the reception of dead bodies for the purpose of post mortem examination, and a post mortem examination may thereupon be held upon such body by such officer as may be appointed by the Governor for that purpose."

post mortem examination.

Objects and Reasons.

This Bill is introduced with a view to more satisfactorily ascertain the cause of death in doubtful cases.

At present the power of ordering a post mortem examination appears to be confined to cases in which a Magistrate, sitting as Coroner, considers such an examination to be necessary (see the Coroners Abolition Ordinance, 17 of 1888).
