## NOTICE.

Government Notification No. 635 of 1901 is hereby cancelled.

In future, parcels forwarded by Parcel Post to Ports in China where British Postal Agencies are established will be enclosed in Mails addressed to the British Office only.

Before the delivery of the parcels can be taken, the addressees will be required to produce a certificate from the Customs Authorities to the effect that the parcels have been passed for and duty paid.

If an examination of the contents of the parcels is considered necessary by the Customs Authorities, such examination will take place in the presence of the addressees in the British Post Office.
