GENERAL MILITARY SERVICE BILL.—The Attorney General addressed the Council and moved the First reading of a Bill intituled An Ordinance to provide for the raising of a force the members of which shall be liable to service with His Majesty's Forces outside the Colony during the present war.

The Colonial Treasurer seconded.

Question—put and agreed to.

Bill read a first time.

BILLS OF EXCHANGE (TIME OF NOTING) BILL.—The Attorney General addressed the Council and moved the Second reading of the Bill intituled An Ordinance to amend the Bills of Exchange Ordinance, 1885.

The Colonial Treasurer seconded.

Question—put and agreed to.

Bill read a second time.

Council in Committee on the Bill.

On Council resuming, the Attorney General reported that the Bill had passed through Committee without amendment and moved that it be read a third time.

The Colonial Treasurer seconded.

Question—put and agreed to.

Bill read a third time and passed.

CLAIMS AGAINST ENEMIES BILL.—The Attorney General addressed the Council and moved the Second reading of the Bill intituled An Ordinance to require certain returns to be made to the Custodian of Enemy Property.

Bill read a second time.

Council in Committee on the Bill.

On Council resuming, the Attorney General reported that the Bill had passed through Committee without amendment and moved that it be read a third time.

The Colonial Treasurer seconded.

SUMMARY OFFENCES AMENDMENT BILL.—The Attorney General addressed the Council and moved the Second reading of the Bill intituled An Ordinance to amend further the Summary Offences Ordinance, 1845.

The Colonial Treasurer seconded.

Question —put and agreed to.

Bill read a second time.

Council in Committee on the Bill.

On the motion of the Attorney General the following amendments were agreed to:

In section 3(c)(i), the words ", or on any Government property unless with the "consent of a public officer, or on any private property unless with the consent of the "owner and of the occupier (if any) of such private property," were inserted after the words "public place" in the last line.

In section 19, the words ", unless the actual offender shall first have been prosecuted to conviction," were inserted after the words "actual offender" in the seventh line.

In section 20, the words ", whether the actual offender be prosecuted or not," were inserted after the words "actual offender" at the end of each of the three sub-sections.

On Council resuming, the Attorney General reported that the Bill had passed through Committee with amendments and moved that it be read a third time.

The Colonial Treasurer seconded.

Question—put and agreed to.

Bill read a third time and passed.

DANGEROUS SMOKING PREVENTION BILL.—The Attorney General addressed the Council and moved the Second reading of the Bill intituled An Ordinance to amend the Dangerous Smoking Prevention Ordinance, 1900.

The Colonial Treasurer seconded.

Question—put and agreed to.

Bill read a second time.

Council in Committee on the Bill.

On Council resuming, the Attorney General reported that the Bill had passed through Committee without amendment and moved that it be read a third time.

The Colonial Treasurer seconded.

Question—put and agreed to.

Bill read a third time and passed.

PEAK DISTRICT (RESIDENCE) BILL.—The Attorney General addressed the Council and moved the Second reading of the Bill intituled An Ordinance to provide that with certain exceptions no person shall reside within the Peak District without the consent of the Governor in Council.
