FORM NO. 1.

Application for an order for the removal to an asylum for the purpose of detention and observation of a person believed to be of unsound mind.

Asylums Ordinance, 1906, s. 7.

FORM No. 5.

Form of order to be given by the senior medical officer for the time being present in and on the staff of a hospital for the removal to an asylum for the purpose of detention and observation of a patient who shows symptoms of suffering from delirium tremens.

Asylums Ordinance, 1906, s. 11.

Regulation made by the Governor in Council under section 47 of the Protection of Women and Girls Ordinance, 1897, Ordinance No. 4 of 1897, on the 4th day of October, 1927.

The regulations made by the Governor in Council under section 47 of the Protection of Women and Girls Ordinance, 1897, and published on pages 178 and 179 of the Regulations of Hong Kong, 1844-1925, under the heading "Refuges" are hereby amended by the insertion in regulation 2 of the words "and as the Victoria Home and Orphanage" next after the words "and as the Eyre Refuge".

NOTE:—Regulation 2, as amended reads,—

- 2. The institutions known as the Italian Convent and as the Eyre Refuge and as the Victoria Home and Orphanage shall also be held to be places of refuge under the Protection of Women and Girls Ordinance, 1897.
