*By-law made under sections 6 (43) (b) and 16 of the Public Health and Buildings Ordinance, 1903, Ordinance No. 1 of 1903.*

The trade or business of resin-boiling is hereby declared by the Sanitary Board to be an offensive trade, and by-law 1 contained in Schedule B to the Public Health and Buildings Ordinance, 1903, under the heading "Offensive trades" is hereby amended by the insertion of "resin-boiling," next after "soap-boiling," in line 2 of the said by-law 1.
